# LYONS MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH 904 Cagel Avenue LOUISVILLE, KENTUCKY 40216

On March 29, 1953, Lyons Missionary Baptist Church was organized in Louisville, Kentucky. This service took place in a small white frame house on Lyons Avenue. It was from this location the church received her name. Many people attended, and several churches were represented. Included in this number were seven charter members: Howard Brown, Barney Brewer, Arnold Brown Griffee, Herman Kinkade, Robert Logsdon, Willard Priddy, and Otto Terry. Letters for these brethren came from Hiawatha Missionary Baptist Church.

As time passed, the church moved to a basement church located at Euclid and Colorado in Louisville. The church was growing and the facilities at this location became inadequate. Looking to the Lord for guidance, a piece of land was purchased on Gagel Avenue, and its members built a large building at this location. That is where Lyons Church worships today. In addition, the property on the west side of the church was purchased for a parsonage in 1991. In 1995, the Fellowship Hall was added to the church.

Lyons has two daughter churches. Becker Drive Missionary Baptist Church of Louisville, Kentucky was organized in 1961, and Unity Missionary Baptist Church of Charlestown, Indiana was organized in 1997. Currently, Lyons is extending an arm to Harmony Missionary Baptist Mission in Lexington, Kentucky with the hopes of its eventual organization.

#### RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 4. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 5. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 6. All members shall conduct themselves in these sessions in a manner conducive to godliness.
- No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 8. On the first day, it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members the second day.
- 9. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 10. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

# **CONSTITUTION**

- Article I This Body shall be known as Siloam Missionary Baptist Association.
- **Article II** These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.
- **Article III** -The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members of fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead since last annual meeting, and financial statement.
- Article IV Each church shall be entitled to three male messengers.
- **Article V** These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer chosen from their Church's membership representing in the Association whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.
- **Article VI** These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.
- **Article VII** It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.
- **Article VIII** These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock a.m., before the first Sunday in October, and continue two days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.
- **Article IX** Messengers from one-third of the churches shall constitute a quorum for transaction of business at any regular meeting.
- **Article X** These meetings shall be missionary in practice as well as theory.
- **Article XI** New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messenger, and on examination, if found Orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator's giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.
- **Article XII** The Association may exclude from the union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principal or disorderly in practice.

**Article XIII** - No Proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

**Article XIV** - The Association at its sittings, welcomes all visiting brethren and sisters from sister churches present, to meet with them, which persons shall have liberty to worship and testify, but no voice nor vote on any subject or question, except by the approval of the Association.

**Article XV**- Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

**Article XVI** -That all questions arising before this Association be decided by a majority vote of the messengers present, including the reception of churches

**Article XVII** - That we will not hold in fellowship any church or correspond with any association that tolerates or practices alien immersion.

**Article XVII** - That all elections (officers, sermon electees, and meeting-place) should follow the procedure of nominations and an open vote.

**Article XIV** - A preacher must hold membership with one of the Churches representing in the Siloam Association to preach before the Association.

**Article XX** - No preacher can preach before the Association for two consecutive years.

# ARTICLES OF FAITH

- **I. OF THE SCRIPTURES** We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter, that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried. - II. OF THE TRUE GOD We believe that there is one, and only one living and true God, an infinite intelligent Spirit, whose name is JEHOVAH, the Maker and supreme Ruler of heaven and earth; inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every divine perfection and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption. - III. OF THE FALL OF MAN We believe that man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse. - **IV. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION** We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace; through the Mediatorial offices of the Son of God; who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience, and by his death made a full atonement for our sins: that having risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all-sufficient Saviour. **V. OF JUSTIFICATION** - We believe that the great gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in him is justification; that justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood; by virtue of which faith his perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity. VI. OF THE FREENESS OF SALVATION - We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent, and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the gospel; which rejection involves him in an aggravated condemnation. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION - We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance and faith and newness of life. VIII. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH -We believe that repentance and faith are sacred duties and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour. IX OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE - We believe that election is the eternal purpose of God, according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of his free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the gospel, that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence. **X. OF SANCTIFICATION** - We believe that sanctification is the process by which according to the will of God, we are made partakers of his holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means - especially the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial watchfulness and prayer. XI OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS - We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation. XII. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL - We believe that the law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of his moral government; that it is holy, just and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts arises entirely from their

love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy law, is one great end of the gospel, and of the means of grace connected with the establishment of the visible church. OF A GOSPEL CHURCH - We believe that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ; governed by his laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by his word; that its only scriptural officers are bishops or pastors and deacons whose qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus. XIV. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER - We believe that the Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried and risen Saviour, with its effect, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation, and to the Lord's Supper; in which the members of the church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self- examination. **XV. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH** - We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day or Christian Sabbath; and it is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of grace, both private and public; and by preparation for the rest that remaineth for the people of God. only in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the a Prince of the kings of the earth. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED - We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of our God, are truly righteous in his esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death. Brother Ricky Huff, Pastor of Lyons, welcomed all and expressed the appreciation of Lyons for the opportunity to host the association.

Brother Moran read a devotion of Mathew 28:1-10, 16-21. Brother Steven Skinner led the congregation in prayer. The congregation sung "When God Dips His Love In My Heart"

# INTRODUCTORY SERMON

Brother Moran introduced Brother James Shoulders, the Pastor of Gladdice Missionary Baptist Church to preach the Introductory Sermon.

Brother Shoulders told about being saved at Maces Hill Missionary Baptist Church when Brother Calvin Gregory was Pastor. He spoke of the great numbers that came for the Lord's help in those days. Brother Shoulders read Romans 11:13-25 to introduce his subject from the 20<sup>th</sup> verse. "Be Not High Minded, But Fear."

Hebrews 11:13-25 - <sup>13</sup>For I speak to you Gentiles, inasmuch as I am the apostle of the Gentiles, I magnify mine office: <sup>14</sup>If by any means I may provoke to emulation them which are my flesh, and might save some of them. <sup>15</sup>For if the casting away of them be the reconciling of the world, what shall the receiving of them be, but life from the dead? <sup>16</sup>For if the firstfruit be holy, the lump is also holy: and if the root be holy, so are the branches. <sup>17</sup>And if some of the branches be broken off, and thou, being a wild olive tree, wert graffed in among them, and with them partakest of the root and fatness of the olive tree; <sup>18</sup>Boast not against the branches. But if thou boast, thou bearest not the root, but the root thee. <sup>19</sup>Thou wilt say then, The branches were broken off, that I might be graffed in. <sup>20</sup>Well; because of unbelief they were broken off, and thou standest by faith. Be not highminded, but fear: <sup>21</sup>For if God spared not the natural branches, *take* heed lest he also spare not thee. <sup>22</sup>Behold therefore the goodness and severity of God: on them which fell, severity; but toward thee, goodness, if thou continue in his goodness: otherwise thou also shalt be cut off. 23 And they also, if they abide not still in unbelief, shall be graffed in: for God is able to graff them in again. <sup>24</sup>For if thou wert cut out of the olive tree which is wild by nature, and wert graffed contrary to nature into a good olive tree: how much more shall these, which be the natural branches, be graffed into their own olive tree? <sup>25</sup>For I

would not, brethren, that ye should be ignorant of this mystery, lest ye should be wise in your own conceits; that blindness in part is happened to Israel, until the fullness of the Gentiles be come in.

High-minded: Webster – haughty, proud, arrogant

Brother Shoulders preached: The children of Israel were God's chosen people. He delivered them time and time again. God made and kept his covenant with the children of Israel and he promised a new covenant. God created everything - earth and man for his honor and glory. God required the teaching of the Law to the children of Israel.

Jesus came preaching repentance and required his disciples to preach repentance. He also required his church to preach to the Gentiles. The Israelites stumbled at the word of God, and the Gentiles, such as we, were commanded to preach repentance. How many want to be a part of the Lord's church today? Today we are closed society, but in our church, we are not to be a closed and high-minded society. Are we cutting ourselves off from the Lord, similar to the children of Israel?

Brother Shoulder read John 13:34-35 and Romans 12:6-12 as instructions for us all.

John 13:34-35 - <sup>34</sup>A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another. <sup>35</sup>By this shall all *men* know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another

Romans 12:6-12 - <sup>6</sup>Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us, whether prophecy, let us prophesy according to the proportion of faith; <sup>7</sup>Or ministry, let us wait on our ministering: or he that teacheth, on teaching; 8Or he that exhorteth, on exhortation: he that giveth, let him do it with simplicity; he that ruleth, with diligence; he that sheweth mercy, with cheerfulness. <sup>9</sup>Let love be without dissimulation. Abhor that which is evil; cleave to that which is good. <sup>10</sup>Be kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love; in honour preferring one another; <sup>11</sup>Not slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord; <sup>12</sup>Rejoicing in hope; patient in tribulation; continuing instant in prayer; <sup>13</sup>Distributing to the necessity of saints; given to hospitality. <sup>14</sup>Bless them which persecute you: bless, and curse not. <sup>15</sup>Rejoice with them that do rejoice, and weep with them that weep. <sup>16</sup>Be of the same mind one toward another. Mind not high things, but condescend to men of low estate. Be not wise in your own conceits. <sup>17</sup>Recompense to no man evil for evil. Provide things honest in the sight of all men. <sup>18</sup> If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men. <sup>19</sup>Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath: for it is written, Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord. <sup>20</sup>Therefore if thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink: for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head. <sup>21</sup>Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good.

Brother Shoulders continued: In response to the question of who should go for the Lord, can we say "Here am I Lord, send me." Many have fought a good fight and made sacrifices to bring the truth to us. It is in the hand of his churches, as the ones represented in the association to carry the Gospel war forward.

In many cases, our numbers are decreasing. Look at the changes in the last five to ten years. Where are we going? Our Lord desires that we provide opportunities to others that will follow us. Brother Shoulder concluded by summarizing that we: Be not High Minded and Have Brotherly Love.

Brother Moran expressed appreciation for the sermon.

# **ORDER OF BUSINESS**

#### MISSIONS

Brother Kenneth Summers gave the report Missions as follows;

The mission of the Church is one, but moves in two directions. It moves outward into the world, and it moves inward into the hearts of its own members. It moves outward to proclaim a message where it is not known, the message of the love of God for mankind and his redemption. It moves inward to clarify the message already heard and partially understood. The Church is responsible for reaching out and out, including more and more of those who will consent to become part of the body of Christ. It is responsible for reaching into the Church continually, confronting its own members with the Gospel of God until each person among us is brought, at length, to their highest fulfillment.

In both its outside work and its inside work, the task of redemption has begun, and it is the Church's function to help to bring it to completion. The Church of Jesus Christ is not a reality that exists for it own sake; it exists because it has a commission. The Church exists by mission as "fire exists by

burning'. The commission of the Church is to proclaim the Kingdom of God and to summon men to its rule.

The Church was brought into being by God himself as an integral part of his great redemptive work for mankind. Its present function is to do the work of God in the world. If we are the body of Christ and he is the head or the life of the Church, it follows that the body is completely subject to Christ, to do his will.

The fact that Paul calls the Church the body of Christ makes us know that the purpose of His Incarnation is also the purpose of the Church. We have been called out of the world only that we might be sent back into the world to serve the world. As the work of Christ could not be done without suffering and death, so the Church cannot do its work without taking upon itself also the marks of a suffering servant.

When the Church seeks to preserve itself, the Church destroys itself; only when the Church gives itself a ransom for many can the Church become the transfigured and glorified Church. As Christ was, so His Church is to be in the world. Christ came into this world not to be ministered unto, but to minister, not to be honored, but to save others. His Church, when she understands her work, will perceive that she is not here to gather to herself wealth or honor, or to seek any temporal aggrandizement and position. She is here unselfishly to live, and if need be, unselfishly to die for the deliverance of the lost sheep, the salvation of lost men.

Brethren, Christ's prayer on the cross was altogether an unselfish one. He does not remember himself in it. Such ought to be the Church's Life-Prayer, the Church's active interposition on behalf of sinners. A Church that does not exist to reclaim heathen nations, to fight with evil, to put down false hood, to take the side of the poor, to denounce injustice and to hold up righteousness, is a Church that has no right to be. The Church that Christ built exists not for itself, any more than Christ existed for Himself. His glory was that he laid aside His glory, and the glory of the Church is when she lays aside her high standing and worldly honor, and counts it to be her glory to gather together the outcasts. Her highest honor is to seek amid the foulest mire the priceless jewels for which Jesus shed his blood, to rescue souls from hell and lead to God, to hope, to heaven, by telling them about our Savior and His great sacrifice for our sins and theirs. This is her heavenly occupation or mission. Rom. 12:1 says, I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God which is your reasonable service. We know that every sacrifice that God accepts he consumes. Pray that God consumes us and uses us to His glory.

We mourn, because in our Churches in the year 2002, we lost as many by death and expulsion (71) as what we gained by baptism and restoration (71). What is at stake here is not numbers but souls. We must continue to do our outside mission work, but much prayer and work must be given to the Church for her continued mission in her bounds.

#### GOD CALLED MINISTERS AND PASTORS:

Brother Vanderpool read the report as follows:

#### Introduction

The apostle Paul wrote to the church at Ephesus and speaking of Christ, said: "And he gave some apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ:" - Ephesians 4: 11-12

Notice that the word "ministers" is not in the above scripture. However, all those mentioned in their respective calling, are called to minister in the work of the Lord. It is our belief that due to the omniscience of God, that he calls those for the various categories and fields of labor that is according to his will and pleasure.

## **Diversity of Services**

As we consider the various fields of labor in God's Kingdom, as mentioned above, it is sometimes experienced that a called servant of God may be involved in more than one of the areas of work. Examples: A full-time pastor is often called as an evangelist for revivals in other churches. A minister may be invited to teach in Bible Studies or Bible Schools, while at the same time serving as a pastor or missionary.

Jesus said: "For the kingdom of heaven is as a man traveling into a far country, who called his own servants, and delivered unto them his goods. And unto one he gave five talents, to another two, and to another one; to every man according to his several ability; and straightway took his journey... After a long time the Lord of those servants cometh, and reckoneth with them." -Matthew 25:14-15, 19

# God has commanded and expects the "Called" to prepare themselves for the work

The apostle Paul, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit wrote to the young minister Timothy and said, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a

workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." II Timothy 3:15. Here, Paul introduces the subject of ministerial education.

#### **Ministerial Education**

Here we wish to give what Dr. William Cathcart said in *Baptist Encyclopedia, Volume 1, page 152*, when published at Philadelphia in 1881, "Brown University, like so many other colleges in this country, owes its origin to the deep seated conviction that religion and learning should unite their forces to elevate and save the race. The Baptist denomination needed an institution, first of all, for fitting of young men entering the Christian ministry, and also to prepare others to engage in scientific and literary pursuits honorably for themselves and beneficially for the community in which they were to live".

The Philadelphia Baptist Association was formed in 1707, and at once took a decided stand in favor of an educated ministry.

Many years elapsed, however, before a definite plan was formed to establish a college suited to the wants of the denomination. The founding of such an institution in Rhode Island was the subject of Rev. Morgan Edwards, the pastor of the Baptist church, the first one, in Philadelphia. Rev. James Manning was sent to Newport to see what interest could be awakened among the Baptists of that flourishing town in carrying out the proposed plan. Meeting with sufficient encouragement to commence operations, Mr. Manning took up residence in Warren, Rhode Island, became pastor of the Baptist church in that place, and in September 1765, was elected president of the infant college, to which was given the name "Rhode Island College". The first commencement was celebrated at Warren, September 7, 1769, at which time seven young men took the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

# **Qualifications for Ordination**

I Timothy 3:1-7 "¹This *is* a true saying, If a man desire the office of a bishop, he desireth a good work. <sup>2</sup>A bishop then must be blameless, the husband of one wife, vigilant, sober, of good behaviour, given to hospitality, apt to teach; <sup>3</sup>Not given to wine, no striker, not greedy of filthy lucre; but patient, not a brawler, not covetous; <sup>4</sup>One that ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity; <sup>5</sup>(For if a man know not how to rule his own house, how shall he take care of the church of God?) <sup>6</sup>Not a novice, lest being lifted up with pride he fall into the condemnation of the devil. <sup>7</sup>Moreover he must have a good report of them which are without; lest he fall into reproach and the snare of the devil."

# Make Sure That the Acknowledgement of a Call is Real

Men who acknowledge a call to the ministry should prayerfully consider and be satisfied that their Spiritual feeling is a call to the ministry by the Holy Spirit. Some of us have known of men who acknowledged to their church that God had called them to preach, went to pulpits and delivered messages, but later made it known that they had been mistaken. If God calls a man to preach, he will work with him in his ministry. Paul, in writing to the

Corinthian church, was explaining to them how God had been a co-laborer with him and Apollos. He said, "Ihave planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase". Then he said, "for we are labourers together with God", I Corinthians 3:6-9.

# A Surrender to The Ministry is a Surrender of A Life To God's Direction

We learn from the study of the scriptures that those called to the ministry were often called to travel to nearby or distant places for the work to which the Lord directed. "And Jesus, walking by the sea of Galilee, saw two brethren, Simon called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea: for they were fishers. And he saith unto them, Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men. And they straightway left their nets, and followed him. And going on from thence, he saw other two brethren, James the son of Zebedee, and John his brother, in a ship with Zebedee their father, mending their nets; and he called them. And they immediately left the ship and their father, and followed him", Matthew 4: 18-22.

Most of us know the story of Jonah who did not want to follow the Lord's leadership; went to sleep, and then awakened to a great surprise and experience. After obedience to God's will and directions, thousands and thousands of Ninevites, hearing his preaching, repented and believed and were saved, Jonah 3:1-5 and Luke 11:32.

Paul, Silas and Timothy were headed for Bithynia, but God forbade them to go there and instead directed them to Macedonia. On that journey, they were imprisoned, beaten with many strips and their feet fastened in stocks, yet, they experienced great success on this journey under God's direction, Acts chapter 16.

Conclusion on this sub-topic: Leave off politics and follow the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

#### **The Bottom Line**

"Every man shall receive his own reward according to his own labour", I Corinthians 3:8

Jesus said, "And, behold I come quickly; and my reward is with me, to give every man according as his work shall be", Revelation 22:12.

Finally: Prayerfully study and prepare yourself; follow the leadership of the Holy Spirit; preach the gospel and leave the results in the hands of God, Ecclesiastes 11:1-6; Isaiah 55:10-11; and Hebrews 10:35-36.

Brother G. W. Knight read the report as follows:

As we begin this theme, one must first realize that God loved us even before we were ever conceived. Through God's great knowledge, he looked out before the world was ever framed and saw that mankind would need a redeemer. God knew man would full from the holy state he would be made in, and therefore would need means to he reconciled to God. So in the council halls of glory; the great plan of God was instituted, to which Jesus stood as a slain Lamb. This was not done by anything other than love. John 3.16 states: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life".

I'm afraid in this day and age, we have lost sight of this most important aspect of God. The Bible says, "God is Love". From this I believe we as the people of God should hold to the unchanging hand that guides us. The Bible tells us that God is not mocked, so why do we continually make a mockery of God and his Word by not doing what it said.

As far as loving one another is concerned, I see no way for us to scripturally do anything else and still be able to call ourselves "the people of God". This is just a simple way for us to show our love to God because he said; how can you love me, whom you have not seen and hate your brother who you have seen. Listen to the following Scriptures and take a lesson from them, II Timothy 1:7 "God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love. and a sound mind". I John 3:17-18 "Whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him? My little children let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth". 1 John 4:12 "If we love one another, God dwelleth in us, and his love is perfected in us". I John 4.19 "We love him, because he first loved us". I John 4:21 "And this commandment have we from him, that he who loved God love his brother". Moses said in Leviticus 19:18 "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself I am the Lord". Psalms 133:1 "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!", Proverbs 10:12 "Hatred stirreth up strifes; but love coverth all sins".

Solomon said in the book of Songs of Solomon 8:6 "Love is as strong as death". Can you tell me anything as final as death here on this earth? You will notice as we go along in this small writing, just how much God wants us to love one another as he first loved us. Let us look again to the Book of all books; wherein lies an answer to all questions. Matthew 5:41 "Whosoever compel thee to go a mile, go with him twain". Or in plain simple language, we are to go out of way to show our love one to another. Jesus said in Matthew 19:19 "love thy neighbor as thyself". Did not the apostle Paul tell the church at Corinth of the three remaining graces, which are Faith, Hope, and Charity. Notice he said in I Corinthians 13:13 that the greatest of these is charity, which is love. I Corinthians 8:1 "Knowledge puffeth up, but charity edifieth". Ephesians 5:2 "Walk in love, as Christ also both loved us, and hath given himself for us an offering". Philippians 2:2 "Fulfill ye my joy, that be likeminded, having the

same love, being of one accord of one mind". Colossians 2:2 "That their hearts might be comforted, being knit together in love.

I will make this insert here, that it is a shame that we have to teach our people to love one another, because as we have tried to show from the Word; God tells us all to love one another; look over our infirmities; and go on and serve the LORD together. Hebrews 10:24 says "Let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works". I Peter 2:17 "Honor all men. Love the brotherhood". I John 4:7 "Let us love one another: for the love is of God; and everyone that loveth is born of God, and knoweth God".

I will conclude with this statement; if we would exercise a little more love among ourselves today, I believe our churches would be in a better condition and still receiving the blessing of God.

# Reaching and Keeping Our Youth

Brother Brad Wheeler read the report as follows:

#### Introduction

The committee does not propose to have all the answers to this most necessary task of the Christian church in this day and time. Our society, much like the Roman Empire during the age and dawn of the Christian Church, dealt with the similar issues of sin and evil. The Church prevailed through the ages and conquered many adversities to bring the truth unto this day. In this age of communications and public education, we face different types of challenges and struggles that must be met.

The early Apostolic Church strove and defeated its troubles for the advancement of the Lord's kingdom on Earth, even unto death. May we have the same persistence realizing that there is a greater reward for those that follow in Christ's steps. Our hearts, minds, and prayers must be continually before the Lord for and on behalf of our young people. We must ask Him to help provide us with the answers to effectively reach and encourage our youth.

We have been given the most precious gifts from the Lord, our young people. But, to whom much is given, much is expected. May we not slumber in realization and fulfillment of the responsibilities of properly and spiritually

raising up the young people given to our Churches. We much prayerfully thank the Lord for these gifts and meet the challenges that these opportunities present.

# Recognizing the need

Before we address the subject of reaching and keeping our youth, we must first realize the need for properly training our young people. Our commitment to those who are babes in Christ must be high if we expect to see results. We cannot expect that spiritually weak homes and churches will produce results. We also cannot, with a rational mind, expect young Christians to spiritually raise themselves. With this said, we do not imply that the both churches and homes are completely spiritually weak because we, as God's church, do see results.

However, we should not take comfort in some results, but we must be fervently resigned that the loss of any young person to the world is a life not well lived for the cause of Christ. The loss of any single young person will affect the local body of Christ for years into the future. Loosing a member in their teens and early twenties may impact that local congregation for up to seventy years. May we all be burdened with the desire to see our young people not physically but spiritually succeed.

The great commission, given as the last words of our Lord before he ascended into heaven, did not state that the Church was only to make sure someone is saved and the work is done. The commission instructed us to go unto the entire world and to teach. For the newly saved convert, the work has only begun for the tree that is spiritually born of God. A young person's life, as well as any Christian's life must be dedicated to bearing fruit for the work of our Lord Jesus Christ. The impact that one saved life can have on so many other lives in one lifetime is great. How can we afford to not take precise, dedicated, and consistent action toward reaching and encouraging our youth?

# Reaching our young people

Reaching is defined in "Webster's English Dictionary" as the act of stretching forth; to hand or pass; to arrive at, to extend to, and to attain to; to get in touch with; to stretch out the hand; and to extend in influence.

Reaching our youth, as spiritually defined (based on the previous definition) would in example follow as; the act of stretching forth our efforts individually and as Churches; to hand or to pass to them certain spiritual facts, beliefs, and standards of God's righteousness; to help them to arrive at a happy spiritually successful life; to extend to them love, encouragement in times of need with compassion for what God wants for their life; to extend to them prayer and truth so that they might attain a spiritual plain that would strengthen the church, their own families, and lives, so that they might be fully in touch with God; by us stretching out our hands to them and to God on their behalf; so that we might positively influence their lives in all aspects for the greater glory of God.

Keep is defined in "Webster's English Dictionary" as meaning to protect, to guard; to take care or to preserve; to provide for, to maintain in a

specified state, to hold for the future; one who guards, watches, or takes care of persons or things (abridged and limited to related topic in context).

Keeping our youth, as spiritually defined (based on the previous definition) would in example follow as; to protect our young people against things that would be to their spiritual, emotional, and physical destruction; to guard against doctrines and beliefs that would be detrimental to them; to care for them through prayer and spiritual living in us; to provide an environment for their success; to help them maintain their relationship with God; so that we might have them for the current and future of our Lord; and ever guarding, watching and caring for them so that they might life spiritually filled lives for the Lord.

# Parental considerations and recommendation when addressing this need

- 1. Consider it spiritually important to take your children to Church every time the doors are open. As a parent, this must be considered an important part of family life. Children, statically, are more likely to consider the Lord important when you consider the Lord important. There are times that they will not want to go when they are younger. As parents, we much not set a precedent in their life that they will carry their whole life.
- 2. Children actually want you to talk to them when no topic is barred. When opportunities arise, it is healthy to open the doors of conversation to them. Children will find things out even at early ages, so it is important that parents discuss topics before their friends do
- 3. Consider having more family time together. This should include praying, reading the scriptures, discussing the previous church service, and what the preacher discussed in the previous service. Find activities that encourage a good relationship with your children, but do not conflict with Church activities.
- 4. Strive to have a spiritual home in all aspects. Work to develop relationships with your children and other children at the Church you attend. Take them to youth weekends and other related activities. You, your family, and your children will be blessed. Also, consider having the churches' young people in your home for activities.
- 5. As parents, follow in Christ's steps. The best example that can be set is the one that you set. Every member of the family should show Love to each other regularly. Be available to your children when they need you. They will experience many disappointments in their young life. Encourage them! Pray for them!

# Church considerations and recommendations when addressing this need

1. Traditions of the Church will change over time. Our goal is to find new ways of reaching our young people with the truth; however, we must be ever cautious and use methods consistent with the truth that does not change. We cannot compromise the truth that our churches uphold with new traditions. One example of a positive change to

traditional methods is youth weekends. Youth weekend services are similar to the joint revivals of old. The youth weekends have been adopted by several churches and have been an effective method of drawing young people together in different areas together for worship. The Holy Spirit, as many of you can attest, has met at many of these services throughout the years. Many young people have been saved, have announced their call to the ministry, and have been encouraged by such activity. They may become less effective over time and another tradition may take its place, but God knows what will work and what will not. May the Holy Spirit guide us in our efforts.

- 2. Our young people are never too young to teach our doctrines once they have been saved. When teaching them, we must consider that they need the milk of the word and not the meat. They are intelligent and desire to take the milk of the word, and it is imperative that they receive a good understanding of basic principles and doctrines early.
- 3. The Church must show interest in them. Churches should address them in sermons, tell them you love them, have special services for them, and show them that they are important to the local body. Church members should take time to find out about their lives and most of all, let them know that you love them. Most young people have a single example that they look up to as an older member. It may be a deacon, it may be the preacher, it may be the Sunday school teacher or it may be some other dedicated member. You might be surprised whom they pick to look up to, because it may be you.
- 4. Strive to be a mentor to young people in your Church and spend time each day praying for one of them or the young people in general.
- 5. Maintaining harmony in the Church body and a Christian attitude at all worship services is very important (without compromising the truth of course). Nothing is more discouraging to a young person than to see us behave in a way that Christ would be ashamed.
- 6. Encourage Sunday School attendance, and establish youth bible studies and meetings at church or in member's homes. Pray that the Lord will move in these services. Also, pray that the Lord will provide effective teachers for these activities. Young men and women in their late twenties to mid forties work well in these tasks.
- 7. Encourage the young people's friends to be their church friends. When churches have smaller numbers of young people, make efforts to get them in touch with and close to young people from other churches.
- 8. Discourage the tendency for young people to be "cliquish", but encourage the church and the young people to see a higher purpose in each other. We much see each other as God recognizes us.
- 9. Encourage them to pray and seek the Holy Spirit to guide their lives. Sometimes, young people are more responsive to the Holy Spirit than older people. Encourage this and your church will be blessed.
- 10. Encourage them to be the church of today and tomorrow because that is what they are.

11. Older members must carefully guide young people with the wisdom that the Lord has granted though prayer and experience.

# Closing

May we join together, committed to the cause of the Gospel of Christ, to properly afford the best chance for our young people to succeed not from the eyes of the world but good spiritual in Christ. We must place before our young people examples of holiness. We must show that the Church is the most important organization on Earth. We must teach and train our young people to be the kind of servants that God would have them to be. We must show that there is both joy and burdens for them to partake in the cause of Christ. We much reach them with the truth of the Word of God and pray that the Holy Spirit would direct and guide them. We, as older members, must encourage them by examples in word and dead. We must encourage our youth in their zeal and guide and direct them based on our experience. We must love them and help them thru the trials of life that we may have also faced. We must not discourage the young people. We should encourage then for today and for the future. Their deeds and works will reflect our church long after we are gone.

# Reaching and Keeping Youth - Brother Jason Huth

Josh. 1:7-8, 4:5-7

I am thankful to be able to speak on such an important topic. No Matter where I go, this seems that this is the most raised subject. It is definitely a concern on everyone's mind and rightfully so. I must say that for a number of years Liberty held Youth Weekend Services and they were extremely successful, resulting in the salvation of a number of young souls either during those services or, in my opinion, because of the effects of those services over the years. Tragically, today, none of those young people attends. Some are even excluded from our fellowship.

The question is not, is there is a problem, but what can we do about this devastating situation. Bro. Brad has spoken generally on the subject of reaching and keeping our youth and Bro. Mike will address the issue of reaching our youth. I feel compelled to speak on how to keep our youth in church. We did not get together and decide to do it in this order but we have followed our individual burdens on this subject, and this is how it came out. I believe the Lord was in it.

I have filtered my thoughts down to three areas that we need to strengthen. We must work on these areas. Inaction will accomplish nothing. Our action will prove where our hearts are on this matter.

# The first area: Strengthen family devotions.

This is religious education in the home. We have all heard, "I don't know what happened. I raised my children in church." That is not enough. We need to raise our children in church, but we also need to raise our children at home. Raise up a child in the way he should go involves more than a couple of hours on Sunday morning. Raising children is something that is continuous and presently active or in other words a full time job. The Devil does not only work on Sunday morning. He is presently-continually walking through the earth seeking whom he may devour and he desires our children. If we are not going to take an active roll in raising our children in the ways of the Lord, be aware that the Devil is taking an active roll in raising them in his ways. The Devil does not work only one day a week. We have had visiting preachers coming to our church for over a year now. One preacher brought his two early teen children and later I was informed by the Sunday School teacher, who had them in class, about something alarming. When asked who King David was they could not answer. One finally guessed that he was Jesus' uncle. When asked to turn to the Old Testament they did not know where the Old Testament was. When asked to name one of the prophets they could not and one finally said Paul. I find that very disturbing and this shows a definite lack of teaching in the home. I wonder how common this problem is.

# The second area: Strengthen fellowship among the youth of the church

To use the churches in Indianapolis as an example, I can not tell you how many times I have called a certain brother over there on any given night and have had to have the conversation cut short because the young people had decided to meet out at the church that night for fellowship. We need to strengthen this is the type of relationship. The church relationships need to be primary and the secular relationships secondary. Your primary relationship will be the one that you feel most accountable to. The youth need strong church relationships. This relationship will be a point of preventative for sin and a point of support for people who are experiencing the same life experiences. In addition, there needs to be a person or persons in the church who have a gift or develop a gift to be a leader of the group. This should be someone who can easily relate to the youth and gain their trust, someone who can teach them the scriptures and give sound advice. I cannot help but think of Bro. Dwen in Jamaica. The young people look up to him as a leader. He is in a very special position.

# The third area: Strengthen inter-age relationships in the church

A house divided against itself will not stand. This is not at the forsaking of proper roles in the church. The younger have a submissive role to the elder members of the church as taught in the scriptures. This holds true in

every aspect of society whether it be family, school, sports or work. We should not be shocked that the same applies to church. There seems to be a large amount of discouragement among our younger members. Our older members need to be sensitive as to whether or not this is a feeling among their particular young members. Discouragement is a killer. Older members need to lead by example and encourage. We need to remember that there is no room for discouragement in the Lord's work. Church members are already receiving discouragement from Satan, his angels, the flesh, and the world. It cannot come from the church or else we are just a time bomb waiting to self-destruct.

There is room however for exhortation and edification. Some may say, "Well, no one exhorts or edifies me". Pride kills churches. Remember we must lead by example. There is no room for self in the Lord's work. Older members need be able to teach the younger members how to deal with sin, how to confess to the Lord, how to forsake sin and patterns of sin in their lives, and how to resist temptation by leaning on each other, prayer and feeding on the Word of God. David said, "thy word have I hid in my heart that I might not sin." Paul said, "let the word of Christ dwell in you richly."

These three steps are just a starting point: 1. Strengthen family devotions; 2. Strengthen fellowship among the youth in the church; 3. Strengthen inter-age relationships in the church. The last two points are critical for any young people who do not have family in the church.

# Reaching and Keeping Youth - Brother Michael Carter

Bro Moderator, preacher brethren, brothers in Christ, I come to you on behalf of the committee "Reaching and Keeping Youth". The first point I would like to make is when there is a problem in life, God is and has the answer. God being perfect in all ways saw the necessity to give us his law and requirements to have on earth, so we, his people can better understand Him. understand only a minute portion of God, and each of us falls short o fHis glorious Being. We will never fully understand God or his law but through Jesus Christ, The Holy Spirit, and the Bible, we can come closer to God's will. Brother Wheeler, Brother Huth, and I must be standing before you today because God's people have a challenge. The three of us were appointed to address the problem that in many situations we are not reaching and Keeping Youth. Our committee does not expect to offer a quick fix that will fill God's meetinghouses full of youth for tomorrow's services. However, the words that Bro Wheeler and Bro Huth have spoken and the words I am speaking now have prayers to God, time studying the Bible, and help from our elders to back them up as we offer this report to you today. We are told in Deuteronomy six that we are required by God's law to spread the gospel to youth by gathering them and assembling them in God's church. After we gather and assemble youth to hear the gospel, scripture tells us our work is not done. Deuteronomy goes on to tell us to teach the youth that we gather. Even then, our work is still unfinished. It is unlikely for us to bring every young person we know or meet into God's church, but we still have 160 hours out of 168 hours a week spent outside of God's meetinghouse to teach youth.

Paul tells us in I Corinthians 13:11 that youth understand spiritual things differently than spiritually mature persons. All of us fall in the trap of expecting young people to understand the world as we do. We should not follow Gods law blindly by teaching young people the same way we do adults. Yes, we need to Teach youth, as anyone else, to love God using the same criteria of the Bible and the Holy Spirit, but by using different methods. By this, I mean adults may enjoy singing "Take My Hand Precious Lord" when a child may sing, "Jesus Loves Me." The same mode of thinking should be applied outside the church more so than inside the church. Although many of these methods have been abused and obscured by certain "so called" churches, we must do it the Biblically Correct way. We must, according to our covenant with God, pick up the pieces of these distorted good intentions and put them back together. As always, we should be aware that there are both sound and unsound practices in this

My main thought on the subject at hand is how to reach youth. When meditating on this topic, I had to establish what reaching entails. When we set out to reach youth, we intend on planting the seed of the Gospel. Our hope is to see lost people saved and in the doors of God's Church.

Earlier I mentioned that of 168-hours each week, we have 160 hours spent out side of Church That statement is saying we spend about 8 hours in church in the span of one week. Some may spend more or less time in church. Nevertheless, 160 hours is a lot of time to spend. Monday, if each individual present will discuss this with one or two church members, and they witness to one young person not in church, a large number of youth will hear the gospel by next Sunday. I hope that one, two, or even more may like what they hear and want to hear more. In Hebrews, 4: 12 we read the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword and I believe it is all we need to reach youth.

Spreading the gospel is the second step in reaching youth; the first is going to them. However, in order for a youth, especially a youth growing up With no biblical influence, to listen to me gospel that we carry with us, we have to know how to approach them. We ask ourselves, "Why we can't get more young people in church. I think the answer is a lot or the time we scare them off, with terminology that they do not understand. Or, even if we get a chance to tell them a God's glories and His Son they stop listening because we have not earned their trust by being willing to spend time showing our love for them. We cannot blame this on the young people. We are supposed to be more Sp1rltually mature than they are. Therefore, let us act like it and not give up "because there is no hope for that Kid".

Mark 10:27 says "with God all things are possible." With the scripture to guide us in life, it is not acceptable for us to conclude "when hope is gone".

That decision is up to God. We need to make every effort to understand all youth and all their diverse ways. Some youths ways are more complex than others and the more complex the ways, the more there is to understand. By no means do I think it would be reasonable for us to accept as normal youthful behavior, deviant and sinful activities. We need to be strong in speaking out against these, but always in a spirit of love and compassion for the young person. I know God can and does open up doors for us to witness to them in many ways, because they are precious to Him and II Peter 3:9 tells us He desires what all will be saved.

Our churches do have a problem reaching and keeping young people. While concluding my thoughts, I want to put it all together. We need to go where the youth are. We need to spread the gospel to them as often and in as many ways as are sound practices. It boils down to tow things. First, we may know some things that work but for some reason we do not do them. Secondly, We always need to be consistent in showing our love for the youth of this world even though that takes a lot of time and effort. It is my prayer that we choose the right ways of doing things and then actually do them. I said at the beginning, I do not have all the answers but I know by God's word, that Love never fails


MAP AND TYPICAL AREA HOTELS
