HISTORY OF LIBERTY MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH

Norton, Ohio

In April 1956, a small group of Christians began meeting in Lodi, OH. The group was presided over by Elder Everett Evans, originally from Tennessee but had moved to Ohio from Michigan. The three following families consisted of nine people that first came together in a small clapboard building on the edge of town, forming the Lodi Missionary Baptist Mission were: Elder Everett Evans (ordained minister), his wife, Jewel, and daughter, Evelyn; Hubert Rodgers (deacon) and his wife, Delphia, and daughters, Patricia and Glenda Rodgers; and Cecil Ross and his wife, Margaret.

On May 12, 1956, Grace Missionary Baptist Church, located in Detroit, MI, extended an arm to the small, three-family mission, granting them the authority to receive and baptize people in the church. Elder Evans was elected pastor.

At this time, Elder William Overton was the undershepherd at Grace, which had originally been given an arm from Old Union Missionary Baptist Church in Bowling Green, KY, making present-day Liberty a "granddaughter" of that church.

Today, Liberty Missionary Baptist Church of Norton, OH is a result of the Lodi Mission. The community of Norton, organized in 1818, is located 28 miles west of Akron and 33 miles south of Cleveland.

Elder Evans, a young 31-year old preacher, was encouraged by Elder Overton. The two men were of rather opposite personalities, with Brother Evans being one whose preaching was exuberant and as many attest, "full of zeal and on fire for the Lord." Brother Overton was more evenly disposed, as well as a man of quick wit, yet one extremely serious while bring the Word of God. Brother Overton took the younger preacher under his wing, advising and offering a corrective hand whenever needed.

Brother Overton was a native of Bethpage, TN. He told of being saved on May 27, 1937 at a revival meeting near Goodlettsville, TN, and surrendering to his call to preach in March 1941 at New Bethel Missionary Baptist Church where he was ordained on March 28, 1942. He and his wife, Dorothy ("Dot"), had two children.

Brother Evans and his wife, Jewel, also had two young children, Evelyn and Billy. Evelyn had already been saved at the time of the mission organization and with her parents, was a member of Grace in Detroit. Brother Evans was born February 22, 1925 in Union County, TN and was converted at a Presbyterian church in Greenback, TN in 1938. In the fall of 1950, he united with the Morgantown Missionary Baptist Church in Tennessee and was ordained to preach by the same body in 1951.

Elder Evans often told about how, as an infant, he was thought to be dead. "My mother prayed fervently for my recovery," he said, promising the Lord if He would spare the child, she would dedicate him to the Lord. He did and she did.

Approximately 20 miles to the northeast of the new mission, was the area of Barberton and Norton, OH. It was in these and surrounding communities that families from many points of the south had come looking for work during the '40s. Many of these families had been brought up in the old-fashioned Baptist churches and had been unable to find a local one of like faith and order.

Rebecca Langford, originally from Tennessee (referred to as "Aunt Becky" and "Granny Langford") was mother and grandmother of many of the area residents. She heard about the mission, and how it supposedly followed the same practices she knew back in Jackson and Macon counties (Tennessee), where she and her late husband, Tommy Langford, had lived. She encouraged members of her extended family and friends to check out the mission. That was the beginning of Liberty.

On a related note, and to get *very* far ahead of the "history," one of Liberty's most recent converts, baptized into the church in August 2014, was then 13-year old Bryan Joseph II. "Granny" Langford was his great, great grandmother. A short time later, young Bryan's father, Bryan Joseph I, was saved and also joined the church, followed soon by his daughter Casey Joseph.

When the mission in Lodi outgrew its space, they moved to a building at the corner of Wadsworth Road and Medina Line Road in Norton.

Elder William Overton recalled it was a cold, snowy Sunday on October 27, 1957 when the mission met at the Masonic Hall in Wadsworth, OH to organize into an independent body of believers. "I remember how the people rejoiced and how the Lord blessed us that day," Brother Overton said.

The seated presbytery consisted of ordained ministers and deacons. In addition to Elders Overton and Evans, the following represented various Missionary Baptist churches: Elder Leonard Pass (minister) and Brother E.B. Carter (deacon), Athens MBC in Waldridge, OH; other deacons included Brother Willie Newberry, Pleasant Valley MBC in North Springs, TN; Brothers Otis Berry, Virgil Russell, Hubert Rodgers, Hubert Dyer, Grace MBC in Detroit, MI.

Brother Virgil Russell read the letters of the twenty-eight charter members who were to constitute the new church.

Since that organization sixty years ago, Liberty has been blessed with godly pastors and their dedicated families. In addition to Elder Evans are Elders H.C. Vanderpool, D.C. Barton, Calvin Perrigo, Kenneth Davis, Don Curtis, Berlon Roy (elected four times, served twice), Ron Galloway, Richard Perrigo, Ensley Wright, Michael Wilson, Rodney Carter, Richard Huskins, Jason Stotler, and present pastor, Cary Kemp.

Brother Overton also recalled in a letter regarding Liberty's 25th anniversary, that he clearly remembered when he and charter member Wick Langford went out to buy the lot off Reimer Road on Maco Drive where the church now stands. They stood on the spot selected and talked of great things that might be accomplished with the help and in the name of the Lord.

It might also be noted that today, a large "snowball bush" in the churchyard is a result of "cuttings" brought from Tennessee by "Granny" Langford. Since she was instrumental in getting her family and friends to attend that early mission, it seems only fitting that the flowering bush stand as a living and growing memorial to her service to God and to the love she held in her heart for those who attended Liberty—not only her kin, but those she knew and loved because of her love for God and His church.

The beauty of the flowers is but another testimony to the existence of God's great love for His children.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.

3. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.

4. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.

5. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.

6. All members shall conduct themselves in these sessions in a manner conducive to godliness.

7. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.

8. On the first day, it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members the second day.

9. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.

10. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

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CONSTITUTION

Article I - This Body shall be known as Siloam Missionary Baptist Association.

Article II - These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III - The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members of fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead since last annual meeting, and financial statement.

Article IV - Each church shall be entitled to three male messengers.

Article V - These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer chosen from their Church's membership representing in the Association whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI - These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII - It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII - These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock a.m., before the first Sunday in October, and continue two days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX - Messengers from one-third of the churches shall constitute a quorum for transaction of business at any regular meeting.

Article X - These meetings shall be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI - New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messenger, and on examination, if found Orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator's giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

Article XII - The Association may exclude from the union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principal or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII - No Proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV - The Association at its sittings, welcomes all visiting brethren and sisters from sister churches present, to meet with them, which persons shall have liberty to worship and testify, but no voice nor vote on any subject or question, except by the approval of the Association.

Article XV- Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

Article XVI -That all questions arising before this Association be decided by a majority vote of the messengers present, including the reception of churches.

Article XVII - That we will not hold in fellowship any church or correspond with any association that tolerates or practices alien immersion.

Article XVII - That all elections (officers, sermon electees, and meeting- place) should follow the procedure of nominations and an open vote.

Article XIV - A preacher must hold membership with one of the Churches representing in the Siloam Association to preach before the Association.

Article XX - No preacher can preach before the Association for two consecutive years.

* The Association will contribute annually, from the Association treasury, one thousand dollars to the host church to assist in the expenses of hosting the session.

* The Association will contribute annually, from the Association treasury, five hundred dollars to the clerk for costs associated with printing and distributing the minutes.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

I. OF THE SCRIPTURES - We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter, that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried. II Tim. 3:16-17; II Tim. 3:15; Prov. 30:5-6; Rom. 2:12; Phil. 3:16; I John 4:1.

II. OF THE TRUE GOD- We believe that there is one, and only one living and true God, an infinite intelligent Spirit, whose name is JEHOVAH, the Maker and supreme Ruler of heaven and earth; inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every divine perfection and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption. III. OF THE FALL OF MAN- We believe that man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse. IV. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION - We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace; through the Mediatorial offices of the Son of God; who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience, and by his death made a full atonement for our sins: that having risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all-sufficient Saviour. V. OF JUSTIFICATION - We believe that the great gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in him is justification; that justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood; by virtue of which faith his perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity. VI. OF THE FREENESS OF SALVATION - We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent, and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the gospel; which rejection involves him in an aggravated condemnation. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION - We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance and faith and newness of life. VIII. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH -We believe that repentance and faith are sacred duties and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE - We believe that election is the eternal purpose of God, according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of his free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the gospel, that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence. XIV. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER - We believe that the Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried and risen Saviour, with its effect, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation, and to the Lord's Supper; in which the members of the church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination. MISSIONS

Brother Kenneth Summers read the report as follows:

Webster's' Dictionary defines mission as to send; A sending or delegating; duty on which one is sent; a commission; an errand; persons sent by authority to perform any service; particularly, persons sent on some political business or to propagate religion. A missionary, who is sent upon a religious field which can be local or foreign. A labor of love so vast, to the point of no limit on this earth. Our main part is we don't put a limit there. We should never be found trying to hold back on the truth, as the bible said for us to "Buy the truth and sell it not" Proverbs 23:23. 1Timothy 5:18 says "Thou shall not muzzle the ox that treadeth out the corn." Simply spoken, don't put a hold on sending the message or messenger of God out in the field.

We call ourselves Missionary Baptist, but are we mission minded, or close minded to think there is no one else out in lands away from our front door that does not need the truth? Think what I'm saying.

We at the Old Fashion Gospel Hour television broadcast are blessed to be able in sending the gospel around the world by means of TV and computer internet. Some people say we are modern in using the television as means of spreading the gospel, but I say we should use all means that God has placed in our hands for the honor and glory of him, who saved us.

In our minutes for 2016, we had listed mission work going on in seven states and mission work going on in at least three countries and on the continent of Africa that we know of, but our Paul is like the apostle Paul, a little hard to keep up with. Some mission fields are Churches that are not yet able to support themselves and a pastor, or at least they don't think they can. Some are very young and need more teaching.

When Christ Jesus our Lord created the church kingdom and that is what he did. Jeremiah 31:22: For the Lord hath created a new thing in the earth, A woman shall compass a man. In other words, all of her desires, all of her hopes, all her needs would be found in one man, Christ our Lord. His Church has clung to him in the good and bad times. J.M. Carroll said in The Trail of Blood that over fifty million Christians died martyr's deaths. When the Lord Jesus set up his Church Kingdom, he put in it also a treasury. For what objects are its funds provided? Mainly these: (1) supplying the Gospel at home; (2) sending it abroad; (3) almsgiving in all its departments. As it is God's method to save men's souls through the preaching of a consecrated, and living ministry, it follows that the greatest necessity for an organized treasury department is ministerial support. This obligation rests upon the positive Law of God, 1 Cor. 9:14 So hath the Lord

Ordained that they which preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel. The word *living* means more than simply food and clothing for the minister himself. It includes a support for his family. 1 Cor. 9:5 Have we not power (or a right) to lead about a sister, a wife, as well as other apostles, and as the brethren of the LORD, and Cephas? These things we know but I remind you. (1 Tim. 3:2,4) A bishop then must be The husband of one wife (A wife) (v.4) having his children in subjection with all gravity. We know that Paul was not chargeable to the Churches at Ephesus (Acts 20:34-35), Corinth (Acts 18:3), and at Thessalonica (Thess. 2:9). In fact, these places were mission fields at that time. He claimed that he had the right and authority to expect his support under the ordinance of the Lord. 1 Cor. 9:14 So hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the Gospel should live of the gospel. Though he preached for nothing to them, he was paid from more liberal Churches (2 Cor. 8-9; Phil. 4:15-16). His objective was to convince gainsayers he was not doing it for money, but for souls, and leave an example to the Churches (2 Cor. 12:13).

When we read Mark 12:41-44 And Jesus sat over against the treasury, and beheld how the people cast into the treasury and many that were rich cast in much. 42 And there came a certain poor widow and she threw in two mites, which make a farthing (50 cents) 43 And he called unto him his disciples, and said unto them, verily I say unto you, that this poor widow has cast more in, than all they which have cast into the treasury. 44 For all they did cast in of their abundance; but she of her want did cast in all that she had, even all her living. Jesus exercises supervision over all. That he knows every man's ability and his motive.

The mission work has to be carried on. We must be mission minded all the time under whatever circumstance. We may be in the hospital, in the nursing home, while with friends, neighbors or strangers, the Word must go out to every precious soul.

THE IMPORTANCE AND SIGNIFICANCE OF BAPTISM

Brothers on the committee were not able to attend the association but sent their report. The association permitted Brother Stephen Skinner to read the report as follows:

The subject before us today is the importance and significance of Baptism.

Baptism was first introduced to the Jews by the command of God through his messenger John the Baptist, Matthew 3:6. John asks the Pharisees and Sadducees two questions. One, "who hath warned you to flee from the wrath to come?" Who preached the Gospel to you? Two, "Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance:" Give me a testimony. John made ready a people prepared for the Lord, Luke 1:17. In the same way Hiram prepared the material for Solomon to build the temple and conveyed it by water to Jerusalem. John preached repentance, waited for them to believe with the heart unto salvation, received their profession of faith, and conveyed them by baptism as prepared material for Jesus. Jesus took the prepared material and began the church. The building of the Kingdom of Heaven has continued for two thousand years and requires all material to be conveyed by baptism into it.

A New Testament church must do three things for the Lord to be with it, Matthew 28:18-20. One, "teach all nations". This teach in the Greek is *matheeteusate* and means to go disciple. We are to preach the Gospel first. Two, baptism is to be administered to those that are saved (disciple). Three, we are to teach "them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you:" Jesus placed baptism second only to salvation.

Jesus paints a picture using candlesticks (lampstands) and candles (lamps). Jesus is seen by the apostle John walking in the midst of the seven golden candlesticks. Revelations 1:12-20. The seven candlesticks are the seven churches, Revelations 1:20. Jesus reasons with them in three of the Gospels what to do with a lit lamp, Matthew 5:15, Mark 4:21, and Luke 8:16. It is clear from these verses the only reasonable place for a lit lamp is on the lampstand. The only reasonable place for a saved person is in the church. We must conclude that Baptism is the next step after salvation.

CHURCH DISCIPLINE

Brother Jerry Miller read the report as follows:

We, the committee, have been assigned the task of presenting, before the Siloam Association at this year's meeting, a report on church discipline. To begin this task, we feel it is only proper to first put before you the most important question concerning church discipline, and that question being, is it scriptural?

We believe the scriptures teach that each of the Lord's churches is autonomous and, therefore, has the authority and responsibility to properly discipline her members according to the scriptures when it becomes necessary to take such action.

To support this statement, we offer the following examples from God's Word. In Matthew 18:15-17, we find the following instructions given by Jesus Himself, as to how we are to handle the matter of one member committing an offense against another member. This is what Jesus said: (15) Moreover if thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone: if he shall hear thee, thou hast gained thy brother. (16) But if he will not hear thee, then take with thee one or two more, that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word may be established. (17) And if he shall neglect to hear them, tell it unto the church: but if he neglect to hear the church, let him be unto thee as an heathen man and a publican.

These scriptures teach us how to deal with private offenses between brothers and sisters and, though we are told these matters are to be brought before the church if necessary, this should be a rare occurrence, because as brothers and sisters in the Lord, we should be able to resolve these matters between each other before it ever reaches that point.

We also have very simple teaching how we are to deal with a public offence. In 1 Corinthians 5:1, Paul the Apostle wrote: *It is reported <u>commonly</u> that there is fornication among you, and such fornication as is not so much as named among the Gentiles, that one should have his father's wife.* In the last verse of the same chapter, his instruction to the church at Corinth was this: *Therefore put away from among yourselves that wicked person*. Now, Paul said this man's sin was common knowledge and, in writing to them, he gives no instruction like that which Jesus gave in Matthew 18. Some believe that in every situation someone should go and talk to the erring member before the church takes any action concerning discipline, however, when there is common public knowledge of sin, this does not seem to be a scriptural requirement.

Church discipline, when properly done, can be very helpful both to the church and to the member who is disciplined. It can be a very effective method of keeping a church as unpolluted by sin as possible. Romans 6:12-13 says: Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, that ye should obey it in the lusts thereof. Neither yield ye your members as instruments of unrighteousness unto sin: but yield yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness unto God. Consider the account found in Joshua 7, how the sins of one man, Achan, had a negative effect upon the nation of Israel as a whole. Remember, Paul wrote this to the church at Corinth: ...a little leaven leaveneth the whole lump (1 Corinthians 5:6).

Paul also wrote to the church at Corinth and instructed them not to be unequally yoked together with unbelievers (2 Corinthians 6:14). Church discipline can certainly accomplish this. 2 Corinthians 5:17 says, "*Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new.*" Though saved people do sin and, at times, live a life that warrant church discipline, it is also true there are times when someone is not living a godly life because they have not experienced the change necessary to do so.

Church discipline will help those in error recover and once again live in a manner which is pleasing to the Lord. As parents, when our children do wrong, do we not discipline them that they may learn to abstain from that which is wrong and do that which is right? Is church discipline not for the same purpose? Galatians 6:1 says: *Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted.* Church discipline should never be done with a "holier than thou" attitude, but should always be done in love and with the knowledge that we are all capable ourselves of being overtaken in a fault.

Though the Bible is the supreme standard, church discipline, however, is not only spoken of in scripture. J.M. Pendleton wrote in length on this matter in his Baptist Church Manual, having devote an entire chapter to the subject. Furthermore, the Church Covenant which hangs on the wall of most Missionary Baptist Churches states: "We engage therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this church, in knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines." Discipline is very important to the welfare of any church, is unfortunately too often neglected, and when neglected becomes harmful.

⁷Render therefore to all their dues: tribute to whom tribute is due; custom to whom custom; fear to whom fear; honour to whom honour.

Matthew 22:15-22

¹⁵ Then went the Pharisees, and took counsel how they might entangle him in his talk. ¹⁶ And they sent out unto him their disciples with the Herodians, saying, Master, we know that thou art true, and teachest the way of God in truth, neither carest thou for any man: for thou regardest not the person of men.

¹⁷ Tell us therefore, What thinkest thou? Is it lawful to give tribute unto Caesar, or not? ¹⁸ But Jesus perceived their wickedness, and said, Why tempt ye me, ye hypocrites?

¹⁹ Shew me the tribute money. And they brought unto him a penny.

²⁰ And he saith unto them, Whose is this image and superscription?

²¹ They say unto him, Caesar's. Then saith he unto them, Render therefore unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's; and unto God the things that are God's.

said, We ought to obey God rather than men (Acts 5:29). Did Peter and the other apostles do anything wrong? Should they have listened to the local authorities? I think not. Whenever the local statutes contradict God's instructions, we are to follow Peter's example.

The title of this report is **"Christians' Role in Civil Government."** There are numerous subjects and topics to report on for this subject. The focus of this report will be our role in educating our children.

Our civil government, by law, has compulsory education. That is, all parents are required to have their children in school. After Moses had presented the Law to Israel, Moses told the nation, as God had instructed in Deuteronomy 6:6-7, *And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart: 7 And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up.* These scriptures place the education of our children, both naturally and spiritually, in the care of the parents. With this said, how do we as the Church, and Christian parents accomplish this? What is the Christian's role in this aspect of civil government?

Noah Webster, sometimes called the father of modern education, and who I believe was a saved man, wrote, "To give children a good education in manners, arts, and science is important; to give them a religious education is indispensable; and an immense responsibility rests on parents and guardians who neglect these duties." He further says, "Any system of education, therefore, which limits instruction to the arts and sciences and rejects the aid of religion in forming characters of citizens, is essentially defective." And to quote him further, "The Christian religion is the most important and one of the first things in which all children, under a free government ought to be instructed... No truth is more evident to my mind than that the Christian religion must be the basis of any government intended to secure the rights and privileges of a free people."¹

William Samuel Johnson, President of Columbia University circa 1800, said to the first graduating class after the Revolutionary War, "You have received a public education, the purpose whereof hath been to quality you the better to serve your Creator and your country... You first great duties... are those you owe to Heaven, to your Creator and Redeemer. Let these ever be present to your minds and exemplified in your lives and conduct."²

Dr. Benjamin Rush, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and one of America's most influential Founding Fathers, said, "We have a republican form of government, and yet we neglect the only means of establishing and perpetuating our republican forms of government; that is, the universal education of our youth in the principles of Christianity by means of the Bible; for this divine book, above all others, favors that equality among mankind, that respect for just laws, and all those sober and frugal virtues which constitute the soul of republicanism."³

In the days of our forefathers, mentioned above, the Christian religion was dominant in our land. The true church had such a great influence; even those religions of another fold were influenced by the true church teachings. Unbelievers also were influenced by the teachings of the church. Until about 100 years ago, this continued to hold true. Then we asked for the government's help (funding), which tied us to their teachings.

We now live in a day that the laws of the land limit what our schools can teach about the Bible, religion, etc. With the modern teaching of the world today, if we as the true church were able to go into the public schools, then the false teachers would also have access. I'm afraid the false teachers have more access than we care to admit, and the true teachings little to none. We still have some very good Christian teachers in some of our school systems who would be willing to suffer persecution for the Lord's cause. But as we see now, this is a very small minority.

Public education is *not a terror to good works* (Romans 13:3). Since Thomas Jefferson coined the phrase, "separation of church and state," this separation worked effectively for the first 150 years of our country. Then Satan reared his head up and, over the past century, and man has changed this separation into a separation from God and children. This was never the intent of our forefathers as we have read above. Our children will learn what is presented to them.

What venue would we allow our children to attend for seven hours each day if we did not know: Who was there? What are they going to be taught? How are they going to be influenced by the peers? Etc. What control do we have over this?

Our children are exposed for seven hours a day to worldly teachings. Can two hours on Sunday offset this? Do we as parents spend even half o this time teaching our children about God? We all have to examine ourselves. Do we send an alcoholic to work in a liquor store? Or someone trying to quit smoking to a smoke shop? I know these two examples are an exaggeration. But we are sending a child, which is a sinner by nature, into a sin-filled taught environment. What can we expect? Are we sacrificing our children for our personal fleshly desire by hanging onto our money, time, and resources for personal fleshly pleasures of the world, when we could use those resources to religiously educate our children? Are we letting our children pass through he fire to Molech?

Hosea 4:6 says: My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge: because thou hast rejected knowledge, I will also reject thee, that thou shalt be no priest to me: seeing thou hast forgotten the law of thy God, I will also forget thy children.

1 Corinthians 10:13 says: There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it.

The true church and/or Christian parents have the obligation of providing a Christian education for our children, and to not violate the laws of the land. How do we accomplish this? One option is homeschool. This is very effective and scriptural (Deuteronomy 6:6-7). Also, most of our local church bodies have the means to open a school for the community. Schools similar to those community schools of the past before we invited the government in. A time before these community schools were consolidated into one public school. This would not only provide a place for the church members' families, but also would influence the whole community.

The negative comments to be made would focus on social skills and money. What more of the world do we need to expose to our children than they already get now? How many of us have been blessed with more than we need? How many churches have big bank accounts for future use, such as fellowship halls, etc.? There is nothing wrong with these. Fellowship halls and Sunday School rooms can be used as classrooms. The future of

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our children, church, and nation are at stake. Unless we put God-given resources to work for the Lord, then the future of our church, children, and nation will be lost.

We have the means to educate our own children and communities. God has provided us with the resources. Let's seek the Lord's guidance in this matter.


