HISTORY OF FAIRVIEW MEMORIAL MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH

As WWI ended and our nation moved into the decade known as the roaring twenties, cultural changes began to occur rapidly within our nation. Not only were the changes occurring in the secular society of America, but changes were developing within our churches and their adherence to the New Testament doctrines concerning the church and experiential salvation. Philosophies of men such as "easy believe-ism and baptismal regeneration" began to be accepted by churches on both a national and a local level. These teachings of men were being used to pollute the central teaching of The Holy Scriptures, God's Plan of Salvation.

Elder C. B, Massey, pastor of Old Union, perceived that the changes were occurring rapidly within Warren County, Kentucky. Under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, Brother Massey was led to begin a series of meetings in Bowling Green, and he asked Elder A. J. Sloan to assist him in the meetings. They were able to gain access to a tobacco warehouse in downtown Bowling Green and began a series of revival services on October 1, 1921. An organ was transported to the building and seats were constructed from planks supported by wooden boxes. After two weeks, with little interest and no visible results from the meeting, Elder Sloan became discouraged and returned home to Lafayette, Tennessee. Elder Sloan was a very capable minister who was used in numerous ways by God and results of his work remain in our churches today. However, he helped in the initial stages of the meeting at the insistence of Brother Massey, whereas Elder Massey was acting on a call from God. The departure of Elder Sloan left the full responsibility of the revival on the shoulders of Elder Massey and in The Omnipotent Hands of God. When God moved on the scene, and the Holy Spirit supplied leadership, the meeting was no longer the same. Sinners were coming under conviction, shouts of praise were being given to God, and professions of faith were being made throughout the old dimly lit make-shift house of worship. Though some might consider the old warehouse as being an unsuitable place for a revival, it became a glorious place for those saved during the meeting and to those who were shouting the praises of the Lord in each service.

God's presence in a revival has an irresistible drawing power and attendance in the meetings swelled into the thousands. The revival attracted worshipers from all social classes and ethnic backgrounds. Because of the large crowds in attendance during the revival no exact count could be given for the number of professions in the meeting. Estimates were that in excess of one hundred were saved during the revival. At the conclusion of the meeting Old Union extended an arm to receive members and Elder Massey baptized thirty individuals into fellowship of the church. The population of Bowling Green at this time was about ten-thousand and an almost unbelievable crowd of five-thousand people gathered at the present-day site of the State Street Bridge to witness the Baptismal Service. Indeed, the city of

Bowling Green was aware that THE LORD PASSED BY!

Elder Massey continued holding services in Bowling Green, preaching in parks, homes, schools, and other public places until a church was organized on November 2, 1924 with four charter members. They were Brother Charlie Cline and Sister Cora Cline from Burton Memorial, and Deacon Loving Rather and Sister Iva Rather from Old Union. The first action of the church was the election of Elder C.B Massey as pastor, and the church received six members by letter that day. From the humble mission work of Elder Massey the membership of the church has grown to its present membership of 368.

The church bought a meeting place on Fifth Street between State and College Streets and the church was given the name of FIFTH STREET MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH. The church remained at the Fifth Street location until the mid-fifties. Parking became a problem brought on by an increase in membership and the increase in the number of church members having cars and so the church began to search for a suitable place to relocate. Two sites came under consideration; an agreement could not be reached so out of Fifth Street Missionary Baptist Church came two strong Missionary Baptist Churches, Faith and Fairview Memorial. Faith purchased property on Tenth Street and built a new house of worship there. Fairview Memorial purchased a parcel of land on Fairview Avenue and met in the basement of the present structure from 1956 until the completion of the sanctuary in 1959. Through the Blessings of God in the addition of members to the church and a continual growth in visitor attendance it became necessary for the church to add a wing to the sanctuary in 2003 and to enlarge the fellowship area of the basement.

Over the ninety-seven-year history of the church, eight ministers have served as pastor. The list includes Elders C.B. Massey, Lloyd Fishburn, F.L. Ray, Jimmy Hagan, William Howard, W.T. Russell, Billy L. Moran, and Jerry R. Miller. God has blessed Fairview Memorial with some of the strongest doctrinal preachers and preachers knowledgeable in Baptist History which are within our Missionary Baptist ranks.

We thank God for the blessings which he has bestowed upon Fairview Memorial Missionary Baptist Church.

NOTE: The 2020 session of the Siloam Missionary Baptist Association was not held due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The Siloam Association commends Fairview Memorial's stewardship in soliciting feedback from member churches in 2020. Then, assiduously making the 2021 session a success.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digresses from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.

3. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.

4. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.

5. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.

6. All members shall conduct themselves in these sessions in a manner conducive to godliness.

7. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.

8. On the first day, it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members the second day.

9. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.

10. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

CONSTITUTION

Article I - This Body shall be known as Siloam Missionary Baptist Association.

Article II - These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III -The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members of fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead since last annual meeting, and financial statement.

Article IV - Each church shall be entitled to three male messengers.

Article V - These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer chosen from their Church's membership representing in the Association whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI - These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII - It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII - These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock a.m., before the first Sunday in October, and continue two days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX - Messengers from one-third of the churches shall constitute a quorum for transaction of business at any regular meeting.

Article X - These meetings shall be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI - New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messenger, and on examination, if found Orthodox and orderly, may be received, and made known by the Moderator's giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

Article XII - The Association may exclude from the union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principal or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII - No Proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV - The Association at its sittings, welcomes all visiting brethren and sisters from sister churches present, to meet with them, which persons shall have liberty to worship and testify, but no voice nor vote on any subject or question, except by the approval of the Association.

Article XV- Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

Article XVI -That all questions arising before this Association be decided by a majority vote of the messengers present, including the reception of churches.

Article XVII - That we will not hold in fellowship any church or correspond with any association that tolerates or practices alien immersion.

Article XVII - That all elections (officers, sermon electees, and meeting- place) should follow the procedure of nominations and an open vote.

Article XIV - A preacher must hold membership with one of the Churches representing in the Siloam Association to preach before the Association.

Article XX - No preacher can preach before the Association for two consecutive years.

* The Association will contribute annually, from the Association treasury, fifteen hundred dollars to the host church to assist in the expenses of hosting the session.

* The Association will contribute annually, from the Association treasury, five hundred dollars to the clerk for costs associated with printing and distributing the minutes.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

I. OF THE SCRIPTURES - We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter, that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried. II. OF THE TRUE GOD- We believe that there is one, and only one living and true God, an infinite intelligent Spirit, whose name is JEHOVAH, the Maker and supreme Ruler of heaven and earth; inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every divine perfection and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption. III. OF THE FALL OF MAN- We believe that man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION - We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace; through the Mediatorial offices of the Son of God; who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience, and by his death made a full atonement for our sins: that having risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all-sufficient Savior. V. OF JUSTIFICATION - We believe that the great gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in him is justification; that justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood; by virtue of which faith his perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity. OF THE FREENESS OF SALVATION - We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent, and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the gospel; which rejection involves him in an aggravated condemnation. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION - We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance and faith and newness of life. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER - We believe that the Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried and risen Savior, with its effect, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation, and to the Lord's Supper; in which the members of the church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self- examination. STATEMENTS OF BELIEF

FRIDAY MORNING PROCEEDINGS

WELCOME

The Siloam Association met together for the 68th session. The proceedings began with Brother Billy Moran welcoming everyone to the Association. "A Beautiful Life" sung with Brother Wayne Strode leading the singing with Sister Janet Gary accompanying on piano. Brother Moran came forward and spoke about canceling the 2020 session of the association. Brother Moran then called on Brother Rick Jones to lead the congregation in prayer. Brother Wayne Strode then led the congregation in singing "I've Never Been Sorry" with Sister Janet Gary accompanying on piano. Brother Moran then introduced Brother Mike Reid to preach the Introductory Sermon. After a brief history of Brother Reid's work for the Lord Brother Reid then came forward to deliver the Introductory Sermon.

INTRODUCTORY SERMON

Brother Reid came forward and after sincere comments requested prayer as he preaches. He read Hebrews 11:8-10. His thought for today is how we strive continually for things that fade away. We spend the prime of our life working for worldly things that will burn. Desire blossoms into sin. Brother Reid spoke of the joy of our first earthly home, but we will move, oftentimes for the better. Next, Brother Reid spoke of Esau, how he hungered. Jacob requested Esau trade his birthright for stew. Unlike Esau, it is important for us to follow the leadership of the Lord. **IT WILL BE WORTH IT!** We will recall nothing worldly in this life when we stand before the Lord.

Brother Reid then spoke of the blessing Abraham would be able to receive. Our forefathers saw this same thing. The promise God gave us is not just for the present but also future generations. <u>This world is not our home!</u> Our desires should not rest upon the things of this world. We need to tell the world this is a dangerous mindset. This present world is full of danger and iniquity and Satan has loads of patience. God's children are sojourners in this world because they should be strangers in this world. Abraham dwelt in tents which afforded him the ability to go whenever the Lord called. However, the tradeoff is that Abraham never had a house with a foundation for the rest of his life, Hebrews 11:9-10. Abraham sought a city with a foundation he could call home. We do not know where the Lord will send us. But God leads everybody, not just preachers, and we must all be willing to go when directed. Not when it is convenient. We must not lay up for ourselves treasures on earth but treasures in heaven, Matthew 6:19-21. Also, wherever we go, build an altar to the Lord.

Brother Aaron Binion prayed the benediction and asked blessing upon the food.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON PROCEEDINGS

The afternoon service began with Brother Wayne Strode leading, "I've Never Been Sorry" with Sister Janet Gary accompanying on the piano. Brother Miller came forth quoting Robert Semple, "Here it may suffice to observe that through these meetings the Gospel was carried into many new places, where the fame of Baptists had previously spread, for great crowds, attending from distant parts, mostly through curiosity, many became enamored with these extraordinary people, and petitioned the Association to send preachers into their neighborhoods. These petitions were readily granted, and the preachers as readily complied with the appointments. Thus, the Association became a medium of propagating the Gospel in new and dark places. They were instrumental in another way in advancing the truth. When assembled, their chief employment was preaching, exhortation, singing, and conversing about their various exertions in the Redeemer's service and attendant success. These things so inflamed the hearth of the ministers that they would leave the Association with a zeal and courage which no obstacles could impede." Brother Miller spoke how associations have furthered the Gospel throughout time. Brother Miller expressed his prayer that this association would ignite a fervent zeal for the faith for which we earnestly contend. After prayer requests Brother Danny Chandler led the congregation in prayer. After prayer Brother Miller called the association into regular business order. The clerk came forward to read the Rules of Decorum. The association then went into this session reports.

MISSIONS

Brother Phil Creecy came forward to present the report:

We are known as "Missionary Baptists" not because of what we do, but for what we believe. What we believe is in a general atonement. To put it more simply, we believe that everyone in the world can be saved (1). For this truth, we use the label "missionary." At the time of our salvation experience God performs an operation on our hearts, exchanging a fleshy one for our stony hearts (2). This gives us a new life that changes our hearts forever and gives us an eternal love from within. Because this is true, Jesus can rightly say the world will know us by our love (3). This love gives us a new perspective after salvation, and it is focused first on those around us, then on those across town, then on those over the mountain, and growing still to encompass the whole world. We may ask, is this love enough to extend to those who sit in darkness our most valued possessions (4): our money, our land, or even our children for mission work? The answer is yes, having Christ in you, the hope of glory because we are Missionary Baptist (5). When we see those who sit in darkness, who sit as prisoners of the darkness of this world under the shadow of eternal death. It causes us to seek to learn more of this love of Christ and emulate Him. This heartbreaking love drives us to desire to see these people delivered from the shadow of death.

While authoring this report thinking about the lost and dying of this world, my eyes cannot help being filled with tears: then I remember the Great God who sent his Son to deliver this world from the darkness and know that we have a small, but important part in their deliverance from their plight (6). It is not for us to make a plan; God already has a perfect one. It is for us to surrender to the working of His plan when he calls us. Each of us has a part in God's plan and must surrender to His will for it to progress smoothly. The souls at the ends of the earth depend on our obedience as well as the lost (7).

As the influence of the world grows around us, the church and its missionaries need to focus more than ever on their holiness. This will enable the world to see what the cause of their troubled and unsettled souls is. It is difficult for the world outside the church to see God and Jesus Christ when their only source of light is dimmed by the stain of sin. This worldliness is our churches manifests itself first as less power with God, and second, less light for the vision of God's plan.

When a missionary goes to the field he is called by God, the subjects of his mission will examine every aspect of his life, be it domestic or foreign. The closer to home the work is, the more essential it is for God's people to be holy. The Lord says to His people, "Be ye holy, for I am holy (8)." This is not an option, but a command. It is also not automatic for a newborn Christian to be holy, but we grow through the process of sanctification and come close to the mark set before us by Christ. A problem becomes more heightened when older Christians refuse to mature. This has been a continuous problem in our churches that has never been absent even from the time of the Apostles, but this is a subject for another discussion.

Several years ago I was given the task of raising funds for the work in northern Ghana, for there were and are specific needs in that region. We support three native missionaries work and major expenses in the different works in the north. Besides a stipend for their needs, we also supply a means of transportation. We have purchased a motorcycle for Brother David Gaanye in the last year so he can go to his outlying missions. This cost about \$700.00. This is more than most citizens of Ghana make in a year. The two missions that are in the outlying villages meet under trees. A building would cost about \$4000.00. They have tried to build structures out of mud bricks with no success. In Buipe, Brother Akanko died. His wife and children still receive his stipend. Sister Akanko has been an extraordinarily strong supporter in the mission and has stood firmly against outside forces who tried to claim the church building there. Brother Samuel informs me that the mission has a new pastor. There are many more efforts that would prosper with finances and manpower. We can only sing praises to the Lord for the faithful churches who continue to support this fund and the many one-time gifts that have come when a need has arisen.

Many of us cannot travel to a foreign shore or even another state, but what God has blessed us with is the ability to support missions financially and with our prayers. It is imperative our walk with the Lord be as close as possible. It says in

Romans 12:8, "he that giveth let him do it with simplicity." The word simplicity is derived from the word that means, "to plat," or, "to braid," or, "to weave together." This shows us that many small fibers can be woven together into a strong rope that can accomplish much work (9). It seems impossible for a small group of people to accomplish much, but remember, we are God's people, and He has a plan (10).

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGLECTING CHURCH DISCIPLINE

Brother Danny Chandler came forward to present the report:

Church discipline is taught in God's word and needs to be taught in our churches. If taught correctly, it should not take anyone by surprise when situations arise that require disciplinary action. Before we summarize the consequences of neglecting discipline, let us identify the two types of scriptural offenses and see how God's word instructs us to manage them.

Regarding personal offenses, Matthew 18: 15-17 tells us that if an offense happens between two brothers in the Lord, the offended party needs to talk with the one who offended him. He is to tell him about his fault between he and him alone. (Keeping this matter at first between the two of them) If he hears him, he has gained his brother and that would be the end of the matter. If he will not hear him, then he is to take with him 1, 2, or 3 witnesses so that every word may be established. (This principle is established in Deuteronomy 17:6 which says at the mouth of 2 or 3 witnesses, shall he that is worthy of death be put to death; but at the mouth of 1 witness he shall not be put to death). So, churches should never take one man's word over the other. If he neglects to hear the 2 or 3 witnesses tell it to the church. If he neglects to hear the church, let him be unto thee as a heathen man and a publican. In other words, exclude him. This verdict should settle all doubts by the church. Unfortunately, we sometimes start this process with the last thing the Bible tells us to do. Often, we take it to the church first rather than quietly seeking the assistance of a couple of good members to sort out the matter. This goes against God's word and usually causes more confusion and harm than good.

Public offenses are those which affect all members equally and are evident before the world. The apostle Paul wrote to the church at Corinth in I Cor. 5 about a man the church had failed to discipline. This man had committed fornication with his father's wife (his stepmother). Paul said, "ye are puffed up, and have not rather mourned that he that has done this deed might be taken away from among you." In other words, ye are full of strife and contention, and ye are full of pride. They were most likely playing favoritism to the offender for some reason or other. They had neglected the laws of discipline in the church. They had not come together and mourned over the moral crime that had been committed. Paul told them though he be absent in body, but present in spirit, he had judged already as though he were present concerning him that had committed this crime. He told them when they came together in the name of our Lord Jesus, and my spirit with the power of the Lord Jesus Christ, to deliver such a one unto Satan for the destruction of the flesh, that the spirit may be saved in the day of the Lord Jesus. In other words, he told them to exclude him for he is guilty of this crime, and then the church would not be held responsible. Because this was a public offense against the whole church, no committee was needed. The duty of the church was to collectively deal with the matter immediately by excluding him from all fellowship. Note that although this offender was apparently a member "in attendance," the same principle should be applied to those who are members "in perpetual absentia."

No church is perfect. Each is made up of baptized believers in Christ who have been saved by His grace. Even though a soul has been saved it still lives in a sinful body that is capable of committing sin. The soul is eternally saved but the body still sins every day. Paul said in I Corinthians 9:27 "but I keep under my body and bring it into subjection; lest that by any means when I have preached to others I myself should be a castaway." Paul is saying to keep control of your body and be careful how you behave in this world, for if you do not your influence will be canceled in the eyes of the people and God. Paul said in I Corinthians 5: 9-13 "I wrote unto you in an epistle not to company with fornicators yet not all together with fornicators of this world, or with covetous, or with extortionist, or with idolaters; for then must ye needs go out of the world. But now I have written unto you not to keep company, if any man that is called a brother be a fornicator, or covetous, or an idolater, or a railer, or a drunkard, or an extortioner; with such a one no not to eat. For what have I to do to judge them also that are without? Do not ye judge them that are within. But them that are without God judgeth. Therefore put away from among yourselves that wicked person."

In John, 17:14, Jesus said "they are not of the world, even as I am not of the world." He was speaking of his church, so we are an organization in this world even though

we are not of the world. God holds us, the church, responsible for our actions as saved individuals and members of the church wherever it is found in the world. In Acts 20:28 Paul tells us "To feed the church of God which he purchased with his own blood." So it is very evident that Christ has a church and has given it rules to go by. In Matthew 28:20 Jesus says "teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. Amen." What happens if we do not teach his church? The members remain undisciplined to the foundational principles which govern the Lord's Church. As a church, we are to insure the alignment of all members with God's word. We are to teach them how to conduct themselves in the church and in the world. If they are weak, we are to help them. If they commit excludable offenses and will not repent of the deeds they have done, we as a church are to exclude them, no matter who they are or what office they might hold in the church.

In I Corinthians chapter 11, Paul gives a real-life example of what happens when discipline is neglected. Divisions enter, confusion ensues, and orderly conduct is abandoned in favor of personal gratification. All of this culminated in an improper observing of the Lord's Supper. Paul went on to say, "For this cause many are weak and sickly among you, and many sleep. For if we would judge ourselves, we should not be judged. But when we are judged, we are chastened of the Lord, that we should not be condemned with the world." It is easy to see the misuse of the Lord's supper had great consequences for the church at Corinth. They were weak, sickly, and many of them died because of this crime. One reason for discipline is so the world will respect the house of God and not be pointing fingers saying, "I'm as good as they are so why would I want to be a part of them?" We are to be a light that cannot be hid, a city that sits on a hill, and by the Lord's help beyond reproach. Sometimes we do not behave ourselves correctly and the one who mentions the crime of a member is persecuted more than the one who commits the offense. These things are shameful. It does not matter who the person is, they are accountable to the Lord and the church. The church is supposed to do its duty to the Lord and exclude those that are guilty. Our main goal in discipline is that we should do it in love for the Lord with a hope that the guilty will straighten up their lives.

In summary, the consequences of neglecting church discipline are many and far reaching. The most devastating consequence, however, is the loss of power with God because of broken fellowship. God cannot fellowship when there is sin in His camp. The loss of power with God means a pervading coldness among the people which then hinders the Holy Spirit in convicting souls of sin. Without conviction there will be no Godly sorrow. Without Godly sorrow, there will be no genuine repentance. Without genuine repentance, there will be no saving faith in Jesus Christ. Your children and grandchildren will then have a form of religion, but without the power to save their souls. May the Lord help us in this difficult, but essential matter of maintaining discipline in His churches.

If only one church existed, it could stand alone as the entirety of Jesus' earthly kingdom **until** God's will of filling the world and every local community in it with such a church had increased that number to two or many more such churches by essentially duplicating the original. What does Jesus want his churches to look like? Must we not go back to the original for that essential pattern? It was to that one *"little flock"* that Jesus said to them it was the will of his Heavenly father to *"give you the kingdom."* (*Luke 12:32*) Early in Jesus' earthly ministry He told Nicodemus that he was unable to perceive the kingdom because he lacked regeneration of his spirit. Standing before this learned teacher was the *"meek and lowly"* King and Messiah with a few of his meek and lowly disciples, but Nicodemus' sinful spirit could not recognize them as the king or kingdom he expected.

When the time was right, that one little flock exploded into numerous near duplicate copies of that first church by a rapid and powerful **revival of eternal truth**. Persecution and Spiritual zeal began to scatter them far and near with that **charitable goal** their motive. Like their Savior, these first churches were not popular to the sinful world.

The last Biblical view we are given of those multiplied churches comes to us in chapters 2 and 3 of Revelation. About 70 years after Jesus' ascension into heaven we are shown a microcosm of seven churches located in and around Ephesus. What did they look like? Like the first one! Five of the seven were reproved by the Lord for their serious existing flaws and commanded to return to rightness with the Lord with repentance and determination to correct those flaws. Despite being flawed, they were all still viewed by the Lord as *"golden candlesticks."* Not one was told to go to any of the others to find the path to correction. Neither of the two not reproved by Jesus were told to correct the others. A return to rightness with the Lord was their path to necessary correction. This does not mean that Christian hearts ought never to speak charitably to spiritual brothers and sisters to warn them of the dangers of their errors. We find this manner of correction continually happening throughout the book of Acts and the epistles of the New Testament scriptures.

We can see a similar revival and results regarding churches in the history of our own nation (and beyond) following what are commonly referred to as the two "Great Awakenings." (About 1720-1790 and 1800-1830). In 1906 the U. S. Commerce department attempted to count the local churches in the U.S.A. Baptists churches counted were 54,880. Their largest affiliation was the Southern Baptist Convention with 21,104 churches. Their churches averaged 95 members. The National Baptist Convention affiliation was second in number counting 18,534 churches averaging 122 members per church. The average Baptist church membership overall was 103 members per church. We can see from this that the "megachurch" craze had not yet overcome the "Baptist" name. All available evidence indicates that almost all of these Baptist churches would be considered fundamentally sound by our present standards. At this same time 64,701 local Methodist churches were also counted. History indicates that the evangelism of these local congregations could hardly be distinguished from that of their Baptist neighbors even while their relics of episcopal government and views on baptism differed. Some other denominations also had many local churches with a degree of sound doctrine and practice and also appearances which resembled Baptists more than the "universal church" from which these "protestants" had departed.

The New Testament Bible clearly reveals that a great deal of awareness persisted among the widely scattered early churches. They tended to maintain knowledge of what was happening in sister churches across a number of national borders and different languages, much more so than what our remaining sound Baptists do today. This lack of awareness is detrimental to our own correction and improvements as well as our primary goal of evangelistic success. Our early churches and also our nation and culture, in general, favored decentralization and preferred local control of everything which could be locally controlled, but that did not include ignorance or apathy concerning our fellow citizens and their welfare, especially their eternal welfare. The early American habit of making ourselves aware of what others think and do, while we hold fast to all that we know for certain, often produced a particularly good result. Biblical humility coupled with such inclination tended to improve both sides when from time-to-time people traded in their own inferior habit to adopt what they clearly perceived as a superior habit from one of their fellow human beings. Whole churches have likewise often benefitted from such mutual study of their differing practices.

John Bunyan was a noted Baptist preacher in England during the 1600's. Among his extensive writings was a booklet on "unity." Most of us already know the importance of unity among the members of one local church. But, what of the unity, which is often desperately needed between churches, IF we are to get done effectively what we owe to the world about us because of the love God has for them? Bunyan chose the word **"enterprises"** to describe effective ways to influence the worldly people around us to come to God and obedience to Him.

"WHERE UNITY AND PEACE ARE WANTING (lacking), THERE CAN BE NO GREAT MATTERS **ENTERPRISED**; WE CANNOT DO MUCH FOR GOD, NOR MUCH FOR ONE ANOTHER. WHEN THE DEVIL WOULD HINDER THE BRINGING TO PASS OF GOOD IN NATIONS AND CHURCHES, HE DIVIDES THEIR COUNSELS ... HE DIVIDES THEIR HEADS, THAT HE MAY DIVIDE THEIR HANDS." (p. 19-20)

"WE LEARN BY REASON, WHAT GREAT THINGS MAY BE DONE IN WORLDLY ACHIEVEMENTS WHERE UNITY IS; AND SHALL NOT REASON (ASSISTED WITH THE MOTIVES OF RELIGION) TEACH US, THAT UNITY AMONG CHRISTIANS MAY ENABLE THEM TO ENTERPRISE GREATER THINGS FOR CHRIST?" (P.21)

"... if Christians that are divided be ever famous for anything, it will be, that they have often met together, and talked of this and the other thing, but they did nothing." (p.22)

During a critical period in the formation of our nation and culture some Baptists were driven by circumstances, or spiritually led (or both), to embrace enterprises which in less critical times would have not been perceived much less undertaken. In some cases, especially in times appearing less critical, such needed enterprising is thwarted by well-meaning brothers fearing needed enterprises as vain "innovations" instead. Careful and prayerful discernment is certainly needed to avoid vain innovations which only appear hopeful, and also to sense God's approval being in a proposal, so as to enlist others once they are persuaded so as to achieve "unity" among brethren involved in a needed enterprise.

(Definition of "ENTERPRISE": (Noah Webster's 1828 dictionary) That which is undertaken or attempted to be performed; a project attempted; particularly, a bold, or arduous or hazardous undertaking, either physical or moral. (Modern Webster's) "An undertaking; project; specifically, (a) a *bold, difficult, dangerous, or important* one ...")

In the middle 1600's Rhode Island Baptists set the pattern for the American republic. That colony established the world's first secular government which guaranteed freedom of conscience and citizen equality. They cleverly adapted this from their model of church government taken from the teachings of Jesus. Was this a great enterprise or what?

From 1783 -1799 Virginia Baptists chose a "General Committee," which functioned primarily as a *political action committee* until Virginia's politicians had disestablished state religion and then led the federal constitutional process in forever forbidding religious establishment at the federal level. We owe our Bill of Rights and final universal acceptance of religious freedom in the whole United States to that Baptist "*enterprise,*"

which also enlisted other more influential supporters. Shorthy before this was accomplished, Baptist factions in Virginia "united" for the first time, under the name "United Baptists."

Note that this committee was dissolved soon after both of these political goals crucial to Baptist future were fully accomplished. John Leland, the chief Baptist promoter of this *enterprise*, moved back to New England where he teamed up with Isaac Backus to promote disestablishment in the Puritan states also. By 1833 that *enterprise* was fully accomplished. Thanks to Baptist *enterprise* freedom of religion became the American way.

Baptists soon became the foremost leaders in promotion of "missions." In pursuit of this they attempted various enterprises to assist in this scriptural cause. For most of a century thousands of Baptist missionaries carried the gospel and established churches over much of the world. Years later, unspiritual, and unscriptural methods copied from Protestant mass evangelists deceiving the masses in this country destroyed the work of many of these overseas enterprises for God's cause and turned them to deception instead.

Educational and benevolent enterprises often suffered the same fate. Worst of all, even most of the churches eventually succumbed to these errors in practice also.

Sound churches, for their own survival, one by one or few by few withdrew from this mass apostasy leaving most of the established enterprises behind also. Many of them, in looking for a scapegoat for so many sister churches succumbing to false evangelism and other modern innovations, targeted all *enterprises* as the culprit. If there was any great error made in their enterprising spirit, it appears to be their attempts to make those enterprises too permanent instead of temporary for accomplishing as needed specific goals. Permanent man-made institutions came to be regarded by too many Baptists as more important to Baptist future than the local scriptural churches themselves, which alone are Divine institutions.

Sound churches must perceive and unify in support of such revealed enterprises as have God's leadership. **We must unite behind what will work.** God knows!

ELDER DELMER RAY CAMERON June 1, 1923 – February 12, 2021

Elder Delmer Ray Cameron, 97, of Newport, Ohio passed away at his home on February 12, 2021. Delmer was born on June 1, 1923 in St. Mary's, WV to the late "Mart" and Charity Cameron. Delmer was a U. S. Army Veteran of WWII, shortly after the war Delmer met and

married the love of his life, Violet Jett Cameron of Pigeon, WV on Christmas Day 1946.

Although Delmer spent his working years as a mechanic and eventually retiring from American Cyanamid Company, his real life's work was laboring for his Lord as an evangelist and pastor among various Baptist churches in WV and Ohio. Delmer was saved at an early age but felt and announced his call to preach in December 1962 and was later fully ordained to that work in 1966. In his early ministry, Delmer labored in many revival efforts and was instrumental in organizing Calvary Baptist Church in St. Mary's, WV. Although Calvary Baptist Church later abandoned its Baptist foundation and turned to the Independent Fundamental movement, Delmer remained true to his Baptist upbringing and Ordination as he continued to search for sound Baptist churches in an area that was quickly becoming void of those faithful to the Lord. As the original Eureka Missionary Baptist Church from Eureka, WV, organized out of Old Time Missionary Baptist Church in June of 1989, relocated across the Ohio River to the Sardis, Ohio area, Delmer joined and labored alongside his son-in-law, Elder Ivan Smith, to grow the church and increase the spread of the gospel in that community. Later, when the Sardis church building was destroyed in a flood and they were forced to find a new meeting place, Delmer helped to make the physical move back across the Ohio River to Friendly, WV and rename the church to Fair Haven Missionary Baptist Church, as it is now known and continues today.

Delmer labored with Fair Haven church up until his death and filled the pulpit many times, even up to a few months before his death at 97. Delmer will be sadly missed by his loving family and church family, but only eternity will reveal the full impact his life will have had on generations to come.


LILLIE MAE WHEAT

MORRISA LEE (JENKINS) SWINDLE January 2, 1956 – February 15, 2021



REPORTS

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

Brother Ronnie Carter presented the report.

Your committee on ministerial education presents the following report. We begin with scripture.

2Tim. 2:15 Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth.

When we look in-depth at this verse, we find that it gives us instruction about the Scriptures.

- It tells us that we must study for God to approve our ministry. That is 1. why one of the qualifications of a Bishop is "Not a novice" 1 Tim.3:6. We know that this is interpreted to mean a preacher that has only, recently announced his call to preach, and therefore has not put enough time in studying and investigating the scriptures to be a shepherd of the flock. Sadly, this may also hold true for many men, who have announced their call, but then do not spend time in the word. This is not to say that a man who is young in the ministry, whatever his age, should not be given and take opportunities to preach, for this is necessary for his spiritual growth. In Joshua 1:8 God says to His servant and the new leader of His people; "This book of the law shall not depart out of thy mouth; but thou shalt meditate therein day and night, that thou mayest observe to do according to all that is written therein: for then thou shalt make thy way prosperous, and then thou shalt have good success." To be a leader of God's people we need to study His Word.
- 2. This verse, 2 Tim. 2:15 also says; We should study so as "**not to be ashamed**". As Ministers, called by God, people will come to us with all kinds of questions. No matter how much we study, we are never going to be able to answer all of them, but the more we study the more questions we will have scriptural answers to.

3. We should study so we can rightly interpret the scriptures. There are many things in the Word of God that we will not understand completely, but with study we can gain better insight into these scriptures.

According to our research it has been many years, if ever since we as an Association have dealt with the subject of Ministerial Education. So, we are going to glean from Sister associations' reports from years gone by, but first let us look at what education is and would it be helpful to the minister. Let it be understood that this committee knows that there is not any amount of education that can teach an uncalled man to preach the Gospel. That calling is from God alone, but we encourage the God Called Preacher to seek out as much education as possible.

We would like to remind the association that the lives of the Old and New Testament writers had a foundation in education. Moses was instructed in all facets of Egyptian education. And Paul was a pharisee. Each of the writers of the Bible, except Luke, were educated in the Jewish manner. They started to school in the fifth or sixth year and the only text was the Torah and the Prophets. Paul must have had additional teaching as a Pharisee of the Pharisees. Luke, we know, was educated as a physician. It is interesting that God chose educated men to deliver his word instead of miraculously giving that ability, which we all know He could have done.

Here are some thoughts that we have on the matter. Paul tells Timothy that one of the qualifications to be a Bishop (pastor) should be **"apt to teach." 1 Tim.3:2** Jesus asked the question in **Luke 6:39, "can the blind lead the blind."** The teacher needs to be better prepared to give instruction to those listening to the lesson. So, if we as God called preachers are standing on the pulpit and behind the book board, should we not be as prepared as possible to deliver a sermon lesson with as much knowledge as possible? There are several ways to acquire a biblical education:

- Sitting under the preaching of God Called men who have studied the scriptures in depth. This is not to take anything away from young preachers, but depth of learning normally takes years to accomplish. Thanks to modern technology, we now have this ability at our fingertips. We have access to sermons and minister's school studies available to us from many sources. We encourage all of our ministers to avail themselves of this resource.
- 2. Develop a systematic study of the scriptures. This is not a time to study for a sermon but is in addition to that. Take a book of the Bible and read it as a student, not as a teacher or preacher. Start at the beginning and use resources that will aid you in the study. Use word study tools to find the meanings for words that may have changed over time. Some sources you will agree with and some you will not but use those resources that you do not agree with to sharpen your skills in defending the faith. This should include seeking out the history and meaning of the book, the background

and historical traditions that surrounded the author.

- 3. Unless we always plan to preach only to Missionary Baptist; we need to know what other denominations and religions believe. We need to be on that Missionary Journey going among the wolves of this world, those who are ravenous and those who wear sheep's clothing.
- 4. We would encourage the beginning of a True Biblical School. This would be a place where our preachers both young and not so young, could attend on a regular basis, to learn about the scriptures from capable preachers and teachers. It would not be sermons, but a step-by-step study of scripture and doctrines. It may also include our understanding and beliefs on end times, church History, Biblical Languages, and other subjects. But its primary responsibility would be to teach the scriptures, where students could discuss the subjects that are in front of them on a regular basis and be better prepared for their ministry.
- We live in a time when an education is highly desired. Graduating from 5. High School is only the beginning for many. Most of us want our children to go on to college or technical school and to gain as much education as is reasonable for their profession. In these institutes of higher education, the instructors are better educated and trained than their students. We further want to go to the best educated and trained professions that can meet our own personal needs; doctors, lawyers, mechanics, and those in the building trades. Why should we dissuade them from seeking out a formal ministerial education? Formal education is one possible way to do this. A Biblical education is exactly that. It has two purposes. To systematically teach the content of the Scriptures, and secondly give the students tools to "Rightly Divide the word of Truth." Whether this be in a class in a school setting or online, there are many opportunities out there. We are also aware that sometimes there are areas of disagreements in what is being taught but believe that a man grounded in the doctrines will be able to understand these disagreements and, use them to his advantage when he is confronted with the same arguments in the future. We are not the first committee to present such a report.

As we said before education is not some modern idea. These Reports are from the Wiseman and Enon Associations Let us go back to 1894:

"We, your committee, submit the following report. We recommend that our people give careful attention to the mental, moral, and spiritual development of their young people. We recommend that our people patronize our denomination's schools in preference to others when practical. Since the education of the masses is increasing, so rapidly, it is all the more necessary that the ministry be educated. Therefore, we recommend that the churches encourage their young preachers to educate themselves and if necessary, assist them in the same." W. W. Payne, G. H. Dorris, J M Phillips, and J.M. Lambert,

In 1924, this report was given on Ministerial Education:

"There are many qualifications that go to make up an acceptable minister of the Gospel. Any of these might be men trained of supreme importance; first the gift of the Holy Spirit, which is of God; second, an education in the teaching of God's word and all other things that will help in its exposition. There are many schools that are devoted to Christian education, and we recommend that our young preachers be helped and urged to attend one of these." submitted by J. A. Carter, J. F. Overton, A. J. Slone, J. W. Keen.

In 1930, the following report was presented.

"We, your committee on Ministerial Education, submit the following report: Preaching the Gospel is the greatest work given to man. We, therefore, recommend that every minister prepare himself to 'rightly divine the word of truth' by using every educational advantage that his intelligence would help him in this, the greatest of all callings." Elder W. T. Taylor, W, O, Johnson, J.D. Cook. In 1950, the following report was given.

"We your committee, submit the following report. We feel that all of God's children need to study the bible and make a stronger effort to know more about the word of God. Especially do men of God, who are to teach others, need to know the Bible. And the same holds true of those who are called on to defend the truth. We know that the Bible, itself says 'Study to show thyself approved unto God,' The more we truly prepare ourselves, the better we can teach and preach and defend the word of truth, as well as to overthrow heresy. We would like to see a sound school for our young preachers, with our older ministers aiding and assisting the young men in their study. We pray that God may soon provide us with a way by which we may be better prepared for the work of the ministry" Submitted by J. D. Birdwell, Arnett Gregory, Oakley Cook.

We are Missionary Baptist. That should mean that we should go out into the world and among the wolves. The committee encourages each of us, but especially our ministerial brethren to do everything possible to prepare for this missionary journey. Education is one tool that we should have at our disposal.

2022 ORDER OF BUSINESS

Brother Ronald Delk read the report as it appears on page 1 and 2. Question called and seconded to adopt the report. Motion passed.

A motion and second was made to suspend business and proceed to the Doctrinal Sermon. Motion passed. Brother Miller requested Brother Wayne Strode to lead the congregation in a song while Brother Kenneth Summers prepared to preach. Brother Strode chose "Heaven's Jubilee" with Brother Cary Kemp accompanying on the piano. Brother Ronald Delk introduced Brother Kenneth Summers, who was elected to preach the Doctrinal Sermon.

DOCTRINAL SERMON

After some humble commentary Brother Kenneth Summers stated many things come upon us due to our disobedience to God. Then spoke of Asa and the great victory God gave but Asa still incurred God's wrath. God revealeth his secret unto his servants the prophets (Amos 3:7). Asa penalized the prophet Hanani for what he did and cast him into prison. Sometimes our friends are our greatest enemy. Asa was diseased in his feet but refused the opportunities of God to repent, seeking out the physicians of the day. Asa died. Brother Summers recounted a story that there was a man who was diagnosed by a doctor simply by his walk and that he would not live long. The Bible tells us, "All things work for good to them that love God." Brother Summers read Hebrews 1:1-14. Brother Summers used the eighth verse as his thought for the day, "Thy throne, O God, is forever and ever: a scepter of righteousness is the scepter of the kingdom." He referenced how the book of Matthew referred to the church as the kingdom of heaven. He spoke that before one can ascend it must first descend as Adam which was not a part of this world received from God the breath of life. When Adam transgressed the law of God, he became a sinner and immediately experienced shame. As a result he attempted to cover his shame with a fig leaf. Adam separated himself from God until God called out asking where he was. Prior to Eve's creation God discussed with Adam that of all the trees in the garden thou mayest freely eat. But of the tree in the midst of the garden, the tree of the knowledge of good and evil thou shalt not eat of it. Brother Summers spoke of the council that took place between God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit and at that time God established a rescue plan for man should he fall. God is a righteous god and righteousness is the scepter of the kingdom but in order to be obedient one must be submissive.

Brother Summers then recounted an instance he chose to go hunting rather than go to church one Sunday morning. Brother Summers stated, "that God commanded him to go to church." The men of Nineveh teach us how we must repent. Jesus is the object of our faith! Jesus stated that he was the vine, and the disciples are the branches. That as the Father has life in himself, likewise the son. He has the power to give everlasting life. Revisiting Adam, when he transgressed, he died spiritually. Children are in their innocence in their youth imitating how parents pray. However, one day they will know conviction and desperation and learn how to truly talk to God. So Adam hid himself from God and Adam understood that he was now at odds with God. Adam offended God. When we, as children of God, neglect prayer due to the hustle and bustle of life we find ourselves removed from God's presence. We need the sap from the vine to be a lively branch.

People that never show a need or a desire to have a relationship with God are confounding. But these are they that have not the spirit. There is a possibility that within our churches there are people that do not truly know the Lord. Faith by itself will not save you, but rather, Christ creating us anew. If a person does not gain the knowledge through experiencing trouble, being convicted, understanding we are an offense to God, how can they truly repent? We may say things but without conviction it is empty rhetoric. The world no longer believes in the experimental knowledge of God. Firsthand experience of the new birth. Jacob, for instance, had an experience with the Lord after wronging his brother and deceiving his father left home as a criminal sneaking away. However, as he laid down that night, Jacob's conscience would not allow him to find peace. Jacob found God that night lying on the earth using a rock for a pillow. Jacob wrestled with the Lord all night until he received a blessing. And God changed his name from Jacob to Israel. And Jacob had power with God because he had overcome. God intends for his people to be a righteous people. When Joseph went down into Egypt, Potiphar's wife enticed him, but Joseph resisted her advances. We are not

permitted to commit sin. While Joshua was the judge Israel resisted idolatry, but once he died, they fell into idolatry incurring God's wrath. Paraphrasing Gideon's life, he illustrated Gideon's questioning of the angel of the Lord using the fleece. During Gideon's life he tore down the alter to Baal and cut down the Groves to Asherah.

The Apostle Paul relayed the commandment that husbands are to love their wives even as Christ also loved the Church and gave himself for it that he may cleanse it and sanctify it by the washing of the word. At these times God calls our sins to our remembrance, and we once again find ourselves in need of forgiveness and repentance. Righteousness is doing that which is right. The scepter of the kingdom represented the authority of the kingdom. We have a responsibility to God to keep under ourselves. If not, it would be preferred that we were never known to be Christians. Along these lines, Jehoshaphat erred in allowing his son to marry the daughter of Ahab forming an alliance against the King of Syria. By nothing more that God's providence Jehoshaphat escaped with his life. Ahab was not so fortunate. God supplies the victories when we rely upon him. This is the type of God that we serve. They cannot touch him, but we can.

The leper that came to the Lord was despised and hated by the world being made to cry out "unclean," anytime anyone drew near. But that leper, upon hearing of Christ and the testimony of one whom had his sight restored testified to him directing him to Christ. Trouble is the starting place for us to come to know and have a supernatural experience with the Lord. "If thou will," the leper cried to the Lord. The Lord responded, "I will."

We have to keep the commandments of the Lord. The woman Christ created. Without Jesus life is empty because the greatest need is hearing the Gospel that the soul might be saved. Baptists bury their dead out of sight in keeping the ordinance of Baptism. John never sprinkled in the middle of the Jordan River. The prerequisite baptism and the superseding baptism is the application of the blood of Christ.

Brother Summers joined the church that Sunday morning. He resisted but relented to the commandment of God. Brother Summers joined upon experience and baptism. Brother Summers stated that he felt clean because he had obeyed God. We know who has the authority to do it, a church of the Lord Jesus Christ. Faith in Christ Jesus gives us life. The life flows from Christ to us. Jesus is the life. Brother Summers closed thanking the association.


